Message from the Headmaster



There's much discussion about the teenage brain and how it changes and develops in a process of synaptic pruning – discarding those old connections in order to cement and strengthen those which are well engaged. There is also the notion that the prefrontal cortex is in a heavy construction zone during the teenage years, making it possible for the emotional limbic system to completely take over. This is the reason behind the very responsive and emotional state of the teenagers that live in our households. The once placid pre-adolescent can be made unrecognisable in a room of chaos which sees no movement prior to 11am on any given Sunday. The only argument is how long this process takes. Some say up to 25 years old for females and up to 30 years for males. Some might say it takes even longer!

And this is where education – a Best All-Round Education – flourishes in enabling various perspectives, opportunities and experience to be included in the formative stages of the teenage brain. I want to write in praise of the teenager, ours especially, and understand how we should measure the success of a school. And what exactly should we expect schools to do? What are the limits of a school's responsibilities to society in general? For, surely, the purpose of education remains to change the 'status quo', not to sustain it.

Children do download the template of what it means to act as an adult from the examples they see in their parents and in their teachers and other significant people in their lives. We must be wary of saddling the young with our uncertainties, insecurities and inadequacies. Commentators tell us that today's young people have never had so many friends – or perhaps so few.

They have never been so supported – or so neglected. They have never shown so much concern for the world around them – or felt so powerless to improve it. They have never seen so many images of perfection and felt so incomplete.

Yet the young don't seem narrow-minded or fearful. The young aren't changing the way they live. They can be slated for being pampered and may appear overly sensitive, but they are also more altruistic than their parents. They tend not to be racist or homophobic and are less likely to drink, smoke or take drugs than previous generations. They are accused of being spoilt and pampered, but their financial futures are precarious. They are constantly having to adapt to new circumstances. They have no idea of the lives they will lead, or what jobs technology and robots will leave for them, but most take this with good grace rather than whingeing. They cope with the massive political, economic, technological, social and sexual changes that are thrown at them, and terrorism has not appeared to destroy their confidence or their tolerant views. Their confidence should make us feel optimistic about the future.

In a former career I was once a teacher of English, leading an English Department that included many texts, including *Catcher in the Rye* written by JD Salinger. He was more of a lightning rod than a seismograph in terms of volume, but Holden Caulfield ('hold in the corn field') epitomised his own faith in a teenager's ability to survive and flourish in a world that had been created by the generations prior to them. Holden worried about the ducks, of all things, in winter. But they, too, survived the season and could navigate their way around landing on ice even in the frozen depths of the winter months. Salinger's proposition was not to



worry about the young as they will flourish and do even better than those generations which produced them. This is also true of education – we as educators have a responsibility to do even better than the status quo, to make our children better than us.

Let's remember that the developing brain is like a garden: it flourishes when it's exposed to a variety of perspectives, learning from each unique view. Death Valley is a desert by summer and a flourishing garden of Eden in the winter, because of the right conditions. By committing to understanding and respecting the thoughts and feelings of those around us, we're not only enriching our minds, but also the conditions, to create a more thoughtful, inclusive and vibrant world. I believe that our students' future is all the better for them being in it. I have confidence in their ability to do a better job than those who produced them.

As we close the year, I issue tremendous acknowledgement and appreciation to our teachers, who have worked hard this year in their role of enriching our students' minds. I also want to acknowledge and appreciate the many King's College groups and affiliates who work for the benefit of the school. I especially include the Board of Governors and Board of Trustees, the Friends' Committee, the Foundation Board, the KCOCA and the Floreat Semper.

I want to pay tribute to the King's College community also. We flourish with your ongoing support and endorsement.

But the final word must go the students of King's College. On so many occasions, you, the students of King's College, have proved your worth. I thank you for your commitment, your irrepressible energy and your sense of grace and decorum. I thank you all for your enthusiasm and vitality. I thank you for your relentless energy and I thank you for reminding us teachers of what really matters and why we are really here.

To the Year 13 Class of 2024, the class that can bring effect to the coming decades: we wish you well on your journey beyond the College and all that it brings. We have been mighty impressed with you as a cohort and I say, on this one occasion in my career only, you'd be one of the best groups we've seen.

As the intellectual giant Dr Seuss would say:

You're off to great places, you're off and away.

Finally, I wish everyone in our community a restful and enjoyable holiday break. We have much to look forward to in 2025.

Message from the Board Chair

I am very aware that as we close this 2024 school year, we say farewell to a **Year 13 group** who could well be described as the 'COVID kids'. This is the year group who started their King's College journey in a way that asked much of them in terms of resilience and flexibility. Our Year 13s were Year 9's in 2020. Within less than two months of the start of their college schooling, they were in a lockdown, learning from their bedrooms. This continued into their second year; some made it to Year 10 Camp and others didn't. Their friendship making, their House bonding, House Music and sports were hampered by lockdowns.

So, there have been two things that have meant a lot to us as Board members this year as we have tracked and interacted with the Year 13 group. The first comes from the work we do as a board to monitor academic results from year to year. This is the year group that, despite all those stops and starts, did very well in their academic results last year.

The Board ask the Senior Prefect Leaders to report directly to us twice a year on their goals, their observations of the student experience in the College, and their feedback on areas for improvement. This year a key goal for that team was to continue to lift school spirit as students recovered from the pandemic years. Their goal was to ensure that they encouraged a spirit of participation and celebration of student extracurricular activities across a wide range of sports, cultural and academic pursuits. This was the second thing that meant a lot to us.

With the help of our communications team, we have seen Year 13s post a great spread of social media messages encouraging students in all sorts of activities. We saw the Prefects put on two spirit raisers in the school – Spirit Week and King's Week. And, most importantly, we saw our prefects and Student Advisory Council members lead excellent messaging out into the student community about the impact of bullying and why others need to speak up against bullying and be empathetic. The Senior Prefect Leaders believed that student voice was crucial in the College's ongoing efforts to have students recognise bullying behaviours and develop empathy, tolerance and support for each other.

The Board have been so pleased to see the breadth of success students have had this year in all aspects of the extracurricular programme. They would make founding Headmaster **Graham Bruce** and his vision of an all-round education very proud. We were also pleased to see that we were the second-highest school in Auckland when it came to University Entrance results.

At the Board table, there has been much focus on continuing to drive the College forward. We were particularly pleased with the work put in by **Geoff Smith** (Deputy Head of Academic) and Heads of Department to develop a new curriculum response for Year 11 in 2025. The College started 2024 under the new Year 11 NCEA curriculum but teachers raised concerns that there would be a gap between the new curriculum and the level of academic knowledge and attainment required in Level 2 NCEA.

The Board have been impressed by the work done throughout the year by teachers in their departments, to devise a new King's Year 11 curriculum, to lift Year 11 learning and better prepare them for Year 12. It also will give us back several weeks in Term 4 for teaching students, not losing them to study and external exams for as long.



The Board very much believe in our dual pathway – but we also recognise that NCEA and the Cambridge exams are different offerings for different ways that students think and to take into account their individual style of work. We believe that both NCEA and CIE test the students well but in different ways; so, we are pleased to see that Year 12 in 2025 will be closer to a 50/50 split between the two pathways.

We appreciated the work that Deputy Head **Rob Griffiths** put into reviewing the Year 10 Adventure Challenge as well. This has been running for a number of years now, so the Board asked the College to check whether it was still a beneficial offering for students. We also wanted to look at ways that we could control cost as much as possible on the camp, as we recognise that the camp fees were increasing and so too the subsidy from the College.

Feedback gathered from students, parents and staff proved how valuable the experience of camp is. The feedback was universally positive! We also recognised that the length of the camp was important, as the development of personal resilience and maturity comes from being away a little longer. The diversity of the camp experiences – from hiking, to sailing, to being in the central North Island mountains – gave students experiences that many hadn't previously been exposed to. So, the Board have endorsed, with some cost containment, the challenge will be continuing for future years.

The opening of Toi Manawa was a significant event for the College and the Board, who have attended many a meeting over the years about the different aspects of managing this significant project (and the expenses that went with it). Toi Manawa now looks stunning in the corner of our campus, continuing the flow of our beautiful red brick and providing multidisciplinary learning under one roof, collaborative learning experiences for students, and enhancing engagement across all levels of performing and creative learning.

We have juggled the difficulties of renovating the Great Hall. It was frustrating to have delays in that project, but breaking up the building work into two stages in the 2024 year meant the students had three terms to have use of this facility.

While that has come at some financial cost in terms of needing to take down scaffolding work and split the construction contract, in the Board's view it has been worth it. We have seen the stellar performance of Chicago, a joyful celebration of Matariki, wonderful Drama productions and the students have valued being together again for assemblies. It is now back in the hands of the building and construction team, and we'll officially reopen the Great Hall at the start of Term 1 next year.

We have also completed a smaller but important project - the building of the new Rolf Porter High Performance Gym.

It has been invigorating for the College to complete these building projects and provide new, more fit-for-purpose learning, playing and exercising spaces. Yes, it has placed more financial stretch on the College, but we've challenged management and ourselves to work through that. We also hope that seeing the value that new buildings and property renovation can give to a school, we'll be able to have better conversations in the future with parents, past parents and Old Collegians about the legacies they can create by giving to these projects.

We really appreciate the part that the Friends' Association and KCOCA have played in supporting College projects and we are excited to see the Foundation Board of Management working more closely with the Board to look beyond their traditional base of Scholarships, to what opportunities they may provide in the future to support further investment into the College. There will be some exciting new initiatives rolled out by the Foundation in 2025 that I encourage you all to look out for.

The Board and Senior Management Team have met to review and revise the Master Property Plan as well, to ensure that we are prioritising correctly for the campus needs of tomorrow. Led by Board member **John Coop**, we put together a set of Guiding Principles for campus development in the future, encapsulating the special nature of the College.



Listening to our senior College leaders and the community, we have prioritised two areas for future development. The first is new teaching and learning spaces to respond to new areas of academic demand, better encourage multidisciplinary learning, and allow for more different styles of delivery of learning. The second priority is to keep improving Boarding. Over time we will develop a Boarding/Residential Learning precinct, but first off will be a new St John's (in a few years' time we hope, depending on funding). We will stage this work, to ensure that the Boarders live uninterrupted on site and will engage with interested parents, Old Collegians and grandparents as we develop plans for a new Boarding House. We are already looking overseas at ideas for learning and modern living spaces for students.

Deputy Chair Hugh Cotterill and I met with the Senior Leadership Team and the Headmaster to formulate the 2025 Annual Goals together. I also want to thank the Chair of our People and Remuneration Committee, Roween Higgie, for the hours she puts in alongside me, to ensure that we conduct a best-practice appraisal of the Headmaster each year and set clear, focused key performance indicators.

One area of the College that I am particularly grateful for work done - and it is often behind the scenes - is our pastoral care service for students. I meet once a month with the Deputy Head Pastoral to discuss, on an anonymised basis, the ways that they've tackled, resolved and supported students who needed additional pastoral care. As a school we offer an individualised response for students who need extra support. The Housemasters play a significant frontline role in this, which I am very grateful for. It is a real team effort along with the Deputy Head Pastoral and the excellent on-site counselling team we have here, reinforcing to me how beneficial the smaller size of our College and our House system is.

Deputy Head **John Payne** has been leading that pastoral care work and our development of best-practice student protection systems over the years. So, I would like to take this opportunity to say thanks for everything that Mr Payne has given King's College. He is a special mix of being firm but empathetic with students and I know that they hold him in much respect. Somewhere in years to come a few students may be gathering together and reminiscing about King's and past teachers, and I am confident John's name could easily come up as one of the ones who made a difference. John - thank you for putting so much heart and commitment into the College; you have very much improved the College by doing so.

And as we farewell Mr Payne and the 2024 school leavers, we realise that the gate opens for another year group to come in, for new teachers to enter and new Deputies to lead us. I encourage staff and students leaving to know that King's is a community, and it very much wants to keep in touch with you.

To Year 13s and all students of King's, next time you sing the school song think of its English translation as it says that the College "teaches us to become people, in which good character prevails".

Stay grounded in that and fly high to seek your opportunities.

Heart of the College

- our Chapel and Community Service

The King's College year began with the immensely sad news of the passing of Mr John Bean in January 2024. Mr Bean was a huge presence at the College and served faithfully from his appointment in 1974 to his final retirement in August 2023. Mr Bean served as a Housemaster, Admissions Officer and Archivist and helped 'seed' a fledgling Community Service programme with reading in schools, which Reverend Warner Wilder built on and strategically upsized to such an extent that at its height 500 students were involved in it annually. At Mr Bean's funeral service held at the College where he was honoured, we were reminded how John showed care for everyone he came across and it was this that significantly became our Chapel theme for the year, Everyone Matters. This sadness was doubly felt later in the term when news emerged that the previous Headmaster of the College Mr John Taylor had died also. A packed Holy Trinity Cathedral paid their respects to Mr Taylor in early April, with special mention being made of his love of the Chapel and deep faith, his encouragement of girls' education and his support of te reo Māori. Both Mr Taylor and Mr Bean made in different ways, massive contributions to the College.

During the course of our Chapel Services – in the weekly and Sunday Chapels – the Chaplaincy team and guest speakers explored what 'everyone matters' means. In Term 1, we shared important messages about how we treat one another. In Sunday House Chapels, I spoke about God's concern for 'the Invisible' and how Jesus specifically attended to someone who suffered from leprosy and was invisible in their own context – except for Jesus. Through 'noticing', 'reaching out' and 'engaging' Jesus sets for us a pattern of what we are called to, as Anglicans and those that profess to follow Jesus in making the invisible, visible.

In Term 2, we broadened this to think more about those on the margins of our society, with **Mr Antony Horacek-Glading** speaking powerfully about his own experience and the challenge of how we interact with those we come across on 'the train...' and in the ordinary.

In Term 3, it was a joy to extend this theme even further, and discuss the global idea that not just 'everyone matters', but that our 'faith matters'. With that, students really enjoyed hearing from a raft of both students and staff as they talked very vulnerably about why their faith matters to them. This has been

brilliant. Sacristans **Sebastian Bhatnagar** (Year 13, Marsden), **Ella Cham** (Year 13, Marion Bruce), **Daniel Shieff** (Year 13, Averill) and **Niki Smith** (Year 13, Middlemore) all spoke candidly about what their faith means to them. It reminded us that faith is present and alive in all sorts of people and that God speaks to us as we are made.

In focusing on our theme, it is important to note that the Chapel continued to advocate this caring approach in its relationships with key community-facing organisations that students help serve. This encompassed weekly after-school opportunities that we are a part of. This included supporting the wonderful work being done by the staff of the Mangere Resettlement Centre, the Anglican Trust for Women and Children, the Ōtāhuhu Town Hall After-school Programme and the St George's, Papatoetoe ICONZ programme. It is enough to say here that the College students do an amazing job of serving in these different ways and do so with compassion and kindness. Of course, on top of this has been scope to give generously to these and other causes, including the annual Runathon that raised \$7,000 and Sunday collections that went to Alongsiders, the Anglican Trust for Women and Children and the Auckland City Mission. There were also clothing and 'can drives' and other student-led initiatives like Red Nose Day in support of Cure Kids and Pink Shirt Day in support of the

Mental Health Foundation. Giving generously is a valuable action of our solidarity with all those who are affected and we are called to care for them as an expression of our Anglican identity.

Finally, a major part of this year's work has been finally arranging for the release and Chapel celebration of our brand new King's Service Book/Ngā Himine Mihinare o Kingi Kāreti. This has been a four-year process that began with the realisation pre-pandemic that we were in need of a resource that brought together the treasures of our three-tikanga Church that reflected liturgy. himene and lotu from tikanga Māori, Pākehā and Pasifika traditions. Having a service book that helps us understand our Anglican identity with morning, midday, evening and night expressions of worship, as well as traditional and contemporary hymns in a variety of languages, is providing opportunities for spiritual engagement and prepares our students for a life of faith outside our gates, should they wish to. These service books were blessed by Bishop Ross and Bishop Kito and we were delighted to hear a number of different music groups sharing beautifully, as well as the Boarding community belting out I, the Lord of Sea and Sky. Kind people have made donations to have family remembered in the life of the Chapel and we are glad to be able to add dedications to these service books. We look forward to doing more of this in 2025.

Next year, we celebrate the rich history and life of our muchbeloved Memorial Chapel. What a gift this Chapel has been. We look forward to celebrating it in some significant community and public occasions. The new service book signals the start of this important occasion. As we approach this special year in the life of the College, I encourage us to think about the many ways in which the Chapel has brought life-giving streams of water and encouragement to the many students and lives that have been refreshed by it. May next year be a source of celebration, life and inspiration for us all.

Community Service 2024

Well, 2024 has come to an end and we have completed another year of Community Service at King's College.

This year, we needed to make the best of our service opportunities with one less afternoon slot available to engage with our community. In addition, several of our stalwart partnerships requested less student involvement weekly due to undersubscription with their own programmes from Term 2 onwards.

We have continued to participate in our Reading in Schools programme at Year 10 as part of Religious Education. In addition to this, some of the Year 10 students have been encouraged to attend, where possible, the after-school programmes or find initiatives outside school to be involved in for their Community Service hours (traditionally, this has only been recommended for senior students).

The after-school sessions at Ōtāhuhu Town Hall have been a major drawcard for many of our seniors, giving them three opportunities a week to participate in various activities including childcare, sports and homework. This provided a good way to accumulate hours for the half colours patch and towards the full colours ties.

Another popular choice since last year was the Refugee Relocation Centre in Māngere. This enabled our students to reach out to each new intake during the year, involving them in sport, crafts and other activities, as well as being a presence for the refugees to practise their English. We also had several individual initiatives (student or House led) that provided clothing and sports equipment for the centre, together with giving the refugees an experience of a day in the life of a school. Their visit to King's included classes in Art, Drama, Dance and Physical Education. Of course, lunch was also provided.

Our Anglican ethos has led to further association with the Anglican Trust for Women and Children (ATWC) with them being recipients of not only student help but also fundraising for some of their initiatives, as well as food and clothing drives and their annual Christmas Gift appeal associated with our end-of-year Carol Services.

Boys' Brigade in Papatoetoe is an option taken up by some of our students on a Thursday.

Behind the scenes, our Community Service students for 2024 have ensured the programme runs smoothly. Part of this has been helping with software and social media posts on a weekly basis.

In addition to weekly service opportunities, there were several one-off events throughout the year. Ōtāhuhu Fun Day is a big event at the start of the year followed by a fundraiser for the Tōtara Park Hospice, in conjunction with the local Rotary Club. This was a weekend event involving students, some of Auckland's top chefs and the Warbirds at Ardmore Airfield.

Students have participated in many holiday and weekend initiatives over the year to date, as well as continuing even through the Christmas break.

The annual Runathon is the final major event for the school year. This sees most of the College running laps of the athletics track to raise funds for various worthy causes, such as Auckland City Mission.

I must conclude with a shout out to several students and staff who have played a pivotal role this year. Thanks goes to **Emily Ramazani Awal** (Year 13, Middlemore), **Matthew Somervaille** (Year 13, Major) and **Madawa Kannangara**, Head of Data Services. With their assistance and expertise, computers did what they should (most of the time) and passion was shown to be the best motivator for both students and the recipients of our Community Service programmes.

Media Studies

2024: A Dynamic Year for Media Studies

It has been an exciting and transformative year for our Media Studies students, marked by a variety of field trips designed to extend learning beyond the classroom and provide hands-on experience with the practical elements of the curriculum.

Term 1: Mastering Production Skills

The focus in Term 1 was on honing production techniques. Our Year 11 Media Studies students visited Auckland Zoo to create a promotional TV commercial, while the AS-level group explored the Devonport tunnels to film thriller projects for their coursework. During these excursions, students gained valuable insights into cinematography, lighting and sound recording on location, resulting in some outstanding final products. Level 2 students attended a workshop at Censor for a Day (run by the Classification Office) to learn about classification laws in New Zealand.

Term 2: Inspiration from Documentary Storytelling

In Term 2, we continued our annual tradition of attending the Doc Edge Film Festival at the Capitol Cinema with our Level 3 and A2 classes. The various documentaries inspired and sparked conversations that motivated students to consider submitting their own work to the festival's competition next year. Another highlight was our field trip to Spookers, which offered unique insights into production design and creative direction. The Year 12 students had an excellent day visiting Images and Sound and Wētā Unleashed, where they attended a workshop on special effects.









Term 3: Exploring the World of Advertising and Postmodern Cinema

Term 3 offered our students a glimpse into the professional world of media and advertising. We were fortunate to visit three prominent advertising agencies – PHD, NZME with Mighty and Stanley St – where our students engaged with industry professionals and learnt about their creative processes. The Year 13 students found this experience particularly valuable for their assessments, incorporating the content and case studies and were also able to enhance their social media content for marketing their own short films.

In addition, the A2 class attended a screening of the newly released film *Beetlejuice Beetlejuice* to analyse its use of post modern elements in preparation for their exams.

Celebrating Student Achievements

In August, we proudly showcased our Year 11, Level 2, Level 3, AS and A2 student films (and some entries from the Media Club) at the King's Media Screening held at Hoyts Cinemas. It was a night of celebration, creativity and community, where we enjoyed the opportunity to acknowledge our students' hard work and achievements with their whānau and friends. We also had a great 'fusion' with arts, design and technology with FUSE night in October to celebrate our Media Studies students.

We extend our heartfelt gratitude to the King's College community for their ongoing support in fostering the growth and success of our Media Studies students through these enriching experiences.

King's Careers 2024: A Year in Focus

As in previous years, the 2024 academic year began with Career Management Seminars for Year 13 students in Term 1. These early-morning sessions provided crucial guidance on the many application tasks, upcoming milestones and critical deadlines that awaited them throughout the year. They also introduced the ongoing support available from King's Careers, aimed at helping students make informed decisions, solve problems and complete applications effectively.

Leading the 2024 Career Liaison team was **Obaya Dietz Zea Betancourt** (Year 13, Marion Bruce), with support from **Will Pegram** (Year 13, Marsden). This dedicated team played a pivotal role in strengthening the connection between King's Careers and each student, particularly those in Year 13. Through House meetings and social media platforms, they ensured their peers were aware of key career events, encouraged participation in career development consultations and promoted workshops offered by King's Careers.

Term 1 also featured the familiar lunchtime programming, with New Zealand universities and tertiary providers delivering tailored sessions to help students explore study options, degree programmes and specialisations. These efforts were further enhanced in Term 2 when all eight New Zealand universities and two polytechnics returned to the College to offer personalised course advice and degree planning in preparation for enrolment in 2025.

Andrea Brook, a highly experienced secondary school career practitioner, joined the King's College Careers team in 2022 to lead support for the increasing number of students applying to study overseas. As the UCAS Advisor for the UK and the Admissions Counsellor for the USA, Andrea offers expert guidance and counselling, application support, and recommendations representing both the student and the College. Her role is vital in managing all overseas applications, with the exception of those to Australian universities.

While the year began with 40-plus students signed up to apply to study overseas, the numbers gradually reduced to the mid-20s, with an almost even split between the UK and USA.

Class of 2023: Where are they Now?

The 2023 school leaver data has revealed interesting shifts in post-college destinations, with a growing number of students opting to study abroad, particularly in Australia.

Growing Interest in Overseas Universities, Especially Australia

One notable trend is the steady rise in the number of King's College students pursuing higher education overseas. Tertiary education data shows that the percentage of school leavers opting out of New Zealand institutions has grown from 15% in 2018 to 25% in 2024. This year, around 96% of the 2024 Year 13 cohort are expected to enrol in tertiary studies, with nearly one in four choosing an overseas university.

Domestic Enrolments in New Zealand

Among those staying in New Zealand, the University of Otago continues to see growth, with enrolments rising from 42 in 2018 to 60 in 2024. The University of Auckland remains the top destination, welcoming 66 enrolments this year. Together, these two universities accounted for nearly half of the 2023 schoolleaver cohort. The University of Canterbury saw a slight decrease to 42 enrolments this year, though this remains above their five-year average.

Victoria University of Wellington, despite declining enrolments in recent years, remains one of the top four New Zealand universities for King's College students. The remaining domestic enrolments are spread across AUT, Massey, Lincoln and Waikato universities, as well as a few polytechnics, private training enterprises (PTEs) and wānanga like Te Wānanga Takiura o Ngā Kura Kaupapa Māori o Aotearoa.

Popular degree choices among these students range from Medicine, Engineering, Veterinary Science and Architecture to Commerce and Law, with Commerce being the most common.

Increasing Interest in Australian Universities

Eligible New Zealand citizens benefit from domestic fee rates in Australia through the Commonwealth Support Scheme. Popular destinations for King's College students include the University of Sydney, University of Melbourne, Monash University, RMIT and the University of Queensland. To cater to this growing interest, King's College and Kristin School jointly hosted an information evening in June, featuring Australian National University (ANU), Bond University and the University of New South Wales (UNSW). This event provided valuable insights for students and their families about Australian tertiary study options.

Popular Overseas University Destinations

King's College students have a strong track record of gaining admission to prestigious universities worldwide, including Ivy League schools in the USA, Russell Group institutions in the UK, and Australia's Group of Eight universities.

A Thriving Careers Department

The King's Careers Centre remains a dynamic and supportive space, offering high-quality career assessments, guidance and counselling to empower students to successfully navigate their future academic and career paths.

Learning Centre

The Learning Centre had an exceptional year in 2024, marked by significant achievements and exciting developments. Supporting more students than ever, we expanded our reach and impact across the school community, from our additional Learning Centre classes to Maths tutorials, small-group phonics, as well as one-to-one academic meetings, educational screenings and Teacher Aide placements. We even had over 280 hours of peer tutoring take place.

This year, we launched a rotating Literacy intervention programme that successfully supported over 20 Year 9 students. Each student made remarkable progress, with an average improvement of 18 months in their reading age, highlighting the programme's effectiveness.

We were also thrilled to welcome Maths expert **Cheryl Henderson** to our team, bringing a wealth of knowledge and enhancing our ability to support students in their mathematical studies. Her expertise has already made a positive impact on our students' learning experiences. **Carine Wesley** joined us in our Teacher Aide department too, a secondary school teacher all the way from Plymouth in England. She has made a fantastic impact so far with our Learning Centre students, who enjoy her sunny optimism and kind help.

In addition to our core University Entrance courses, we continued to foster independent learning among our seniors. Students had the opportunity to attain extra credits by becoming certified Baristas and obtaining their Forklift Licences, demonstrating their commitment to acquiring a wide range of valuable skills.

Looking ahead to 2025, we are excited to further develop new ways to support co-requisite requirements and ensure every student fulfils their potential. We eagerly anticipate welcoming our new Year 9 cohort and continuing to elevate the Learning Centre to even greater heights!

Battered and bruised, yet still proud, each player was warmly greeted by mothers, fathers, brothers and sisters - individually, with a hug and with words of love and pride. Players, united as a team, became again the individual, the son who has the unconditional love and support of family. Many play for the accolades the school dispenses, but nothing can quite measure up to the affection and acknowledgement of those who love us the most.

However, for me, the most moving moment was the final act I saw: a St Peter's player came jogging across to the King's side and leapt the fence, giving no indication that he had just played an exhausting game, to land at the feet of his grandparents. They were on our side because the granddad was in a wheelchair and access was easier. The St Peter's player was so affectionate, hugging his grandparents and thanking them for turning up. His hand was resting gently on his granddad's shoulder, and he spent time with them asking them how they were and clearly very pleased to have 'done them proud'.

It is a common and everyday story. Being there to support our children when we can does wonders for their confidence and their sense of identity. Our busy lives sometimes mean a juggling of priorities, but as Dr Dona Matthews says, "...you being available in the teen years means you're more likely to be there as a steadying influence in those precarious moments when your child might otherwise behave recklessly..."

But it works both ways. I know those St Peter's grandparents took just as much away from the game as their grandson did with his victory - an afternoon to remember, indeed.

Out and About

NCEA Level 3 Outdoor Education

Our year in Level 3 Outdoor Education

2024 saw 30 Level 3 students choose to take Outdoor Education as one of their subject options. Throughout the year, students have taken part in five internally assessed standards each linked to various outdoor contexts such as snorkelling, rock climbing, canoeing and mountain biking.

Students started the year analysing safety management issues using the context of a summer camp. Students took part in an overnight camp at Tāwharanui Regional Park where they took part in activities such as surfing, beach games, snorkelling and a hike. Students were lucky enough to have beautiful weather over their two days and this camp is considered a nice introduction to camping skills that students will need to develop throughout the year. While on camp, students had to look into possible issues that could arise from the use of Risk Assessment Management Strategies (RAMS) forms, external providers, informed consent and a 'one size fits all' programme before suggesting strategies that could be put in place to minimise harm.

The students' next unit of work was reflecting on their previous experiences in physical activity. They looked into factors that may have impacted their participation in certain activities, such as barriers and enablers, before devising strategies to ensure future participation and lifelong wellbeing. Throughout this unit of work, students got to see how easily they could access different recreational and outdoor activities within Auckland. They took part in a couple of day trips in West Auckland which included activities such as mountain biking, disc golf, high ropes, indoor bouldering and a trampoline park. They also participated in outdoor rock climbing in Mount Wellington which served as a reassessment opportunity to improve their grade in their practical standard.

The end of Term 3 saw the pinnacle event for the year - the Whanganui River Journey. This journey involved a travel and preparation day, followed by two and a half days paddling down the Whanganui River, off the grid, in Canadian canoes. In this camp, students were able to assess whether or not their strategies were successful and demonstrate and gather examples of contemporary leadership styles in action. Rob Paterson, who led this year's trip noted, "It didn't take too long on the trip before we had our first capsize, but our students learnt quickly and there was only one other capsize during the trip". He also acknowledged that although the students experienced some challenging conditions throughout the trip, he was thrilled with the attitude and resilience shown as they overcame all these extra challenges with high morale.

It was another adventurous and exciting year in Outdoor Education and we look forward to seeing what 2025 holds for our new cohort.



The Duke of Edinburgh's Hillary Award

The ethos of the Duke of Edinburgh's Hillary Award mirrors that of King's College in many ways. The Award encourages participants to push themselves, face challenges, offer service to others and work consistently towards continuous improvement.

The Award consists of four sections at the Bronze and Silver levels: Physical Recreation; Skills; Volunteering; and the Adventurous Journey. At the Gold level, there is an additional section – the Gold Residential.

All four sections of the Bronze award can be completed in Year 10 through normal school activities and participation in the Year 10 Adventure Challenge. Students who join after Year 10 can complete three of the sections but will have to complete the Adventurous Journey outside of school.

Participants of the award complete their hours within the College through summer and winter sports, community service, tutoring, and extracurricular music lessons. Others complete their awards through activities outside of the College, such as volunteering for the SPCA, lifesaving and helping the elderly.

For their Adventurous Journeys, participants can find themselves kayaking in the Hauraki Gulf, learning to scuba-dive in Fiji, or spending several days out bush walking. While not quite endless, there really are a multitude of options available.

The year 2024 has – at the time of writing – seen a record number of registrations with 66 students completing their Bronze, 31 completing Silver and 16 completing their Gold. We have even seen one student – **Brandon Wu** (Year 9, Marsden) – complete his Bronze while still in Year 9.

There are often questions about the different aspects of the Award; as a result, the introduction of a weekly drop-in session has proved extremely popular and has played a key role in getting several accounts reactivated and awards finally completed after years of inactivity.

So, if you've not yet signed up for the Award, what are you waiting for?

For those with award levels in progress, perhaps it's time for a spring-clean of your account. Time to log on, and if need be have the account reactivated. Time to chase those expired assessment requests, or to work to find new assessors if the original ones are no longer available. Stay motivated and remember we are always available to help you achieve your award.


Scholars' Common Room


E - Environmental Club



Days 8-10



We also passed the Vehicle Assembly Building, the tallest single-storey building in the world, where shuttles like Saturn V and SLS rockets are assembled. In the distance, we witnessed the test-firing of a Vulcan rocket and caught a glimpse of a Falcon 9 rocket awaiting launch. The day concluded with a visit to the Saturn V Building, where we were treated to a fascinating movie about the history of the Saturn V rocket and the Apollo programme. Once we arrived back at our hotel we got confirmation that the Falcon 9 rocket would launch; but first, we had dinner with Mr Ed Wilson, a highly accomplished individual with a background in Electrical and Computer Engineering. A retired two-star general, he served in various high-ranking roles in the US Air Force. Around 11pm, after playing some volleyball, we headed down to the beach to watch the launch. It was a great sight - an initial flash so bright it was daylight, then a burning flame sped off towards the sky.

On our penultimate day at NASA, we participated in an engaging activity where students had to decide what equipment they would take on a Mars rover expedition. This hands-on challenge was made even more interesting by unexpected 'emergencies' introduced by the teachers. Afterwards, we explored the Journey to Mars exhibit, which showcased replicas and working prototypes of Mars rovers and helicopters. Our final day was equally thrilling, as we headed out for a Midway airboat ride, zipping across the water while learning about the surrounding ecosystem. Though the weather was cooler than expected, we were lucky enough to spot a few alligators and even had the chance to hold a baby 'gator.

Europe Tour

In the April school holidays, 36 students of Art History, Classical Studies and Latin were delighted to travel to Greece and Italy for our first Europe Tour post-COVID-19. We had a jam-packed itinerary, making the most of the sites, works and artefacts that were relevant to the Advanced Placement, Cambridge and NCEA curricula for all three subjects, as well as squeezing in shopping and sampling the local cuisine!

Northern Greece was our first stop, allowing us to visit the home of Alexander the Great in ancient Macedonia. We then continued south via Delphi, the Greek centre of the world, and Athens, which was a real highlight for our NCEA Classical Studies students. In the Peloponnese, we explored Agamemnon's citadel in Mycenae and the beautiful and quaint town of Nafplio before enjoying a Latin recital in the ancient theatre of Epidaurus. Our final Greek site was ancient Olympia, the site of the original Olympic Games. The group completed the traditional sprint in the Olympic Stadium, including a hotly contested race for an authentic Olympian olive wreath. We then farewelled Anastasia and Nikos, our Greek guide and bus driver, then caught an overnight ferry across the Adriatic Sea to Italy. John Payne was lucky to celebrate his birthday on board with a midnight serenade performed by some enthusiastic students and a ukelele!

We began the Italian section of our odyssey based in Sorrento, a stunning town overlooking the Bay of Naples. Some were pleased to finally have time for laundry, while others hit the souvenir shops and enjoyed a gelato (or three!). Our Latinists were incredibly excited to walk the streets of Pompeii and re-enact the adventures they had translated in the Cambridge Latin Course, as well as taking the obligatory photo outside the House of Caecilius. Others had their memories scarred by the "secret cabinet" at the Naples Archaeological Museum that afternoon – they may have missed the content warning from **Lauren Lethbridge** on the bus...

Rome was a real highlight for students of all three subjects, with something for everyone (plus plenty of free time for shopping and sightseeing!). Over three days, we checked out the Colosseum, Forum, Pantheon and Capitoline Museum, as well as the churches of San Pietro in Vincoli, San Clemente, Santa Maria in Trastevere and Santa Cecilia. Most impressively, we braved both the Rome Metro, the jam-packed Vatican Museums and the Sistine Chapel without losing anyone from the herd!

In Northern Italy, our Byzantine enthusiasts and art historians took over as we visited the Palazzo Ducale of Urbino, Basilica of Galla Placidia, San Vitale in Ravenna and the Scrovegni Chapel in Padua. We also toured Venice, which put on some stunning weather for St Mark's Day, where **David Parr** and our Art History students enjoyed sharing some modern art with the rest of the group at the Peggy Guggenheim Collection. We spent our final two nights in what felt like Florence's version of *The White Lotus*, which was a good base from which to explore the city. We checked out the Uffizi and Basilica of Santa Croce together, before setting the troops loose to spend their remaining euros in the leather markets.

In 2023, the idea of forming a choral chamber ensemble began to take shape among a group of senior choir students who were seeking the challenge of singing in a smaller, more focused group. Early this year, the ensemble came together in secret, unsure if this new venture would be viable. Their growing reputation led to invitations to perform at notable events, including the Annual NZ Police Awards and the Auckland War Memorial Museum's Remembrance Ceremony on Armistice Day.

For all of our members, it has been an incredible year of musical and personal growth. The opportunity to tackle challenging repertoire, expand our vocal abilities and mature as performers has been invaluable.

With deep gratitude to my fellow choir director Rachel **Alexander Sutherland**, I am looking forward to what lies ahead!



Kapa Haka

This year, we put together a Kapa Haka campaign for the 2024 ASB Polyfest competition. For the group to be cohesive and co-ordinated in just six weeks, the goal was to ensure that te reo Māori, tikanga Māori, mātauranga Māori and Māori values were strongly embedded and were the foundations of the campaign.

The practices were time-consuming and demanded commitment in the same way that an athlete would have to show in order to be selected for a premier sports team. And the performers well and truly stepped up to the challenge.

The preparation also involved a noho marae where the group stayed on the marae at Unitec in Mount Albert to complete long nights of practise followed by early starts and eventually saw a huge improvement. Tinihuia Lee-Lemon (Year 12, Marion Bruce) said it was worth it - "This was the first time for many of us to experience a noho marae and it was very intense; we stayed up until late every night practising and would wake up at 7am to get ready for practice the next day. Although this noho marae was very tiring the whole ropū could see significant improvements."

The lead students were eventually selected for the ropu with Manea Harrison (Year 12, Marion Bruce) being appointed the female lead and Keanu Ezekiela (Year 13, Parnell) taking up the male lead. Both had worked hard to demonstrate their leadership in the practices. Both students wanted to lead and this meant proving their commitment, confidence and connection with each other and the group around them. They knew that the roles had to be earned, so building that trust and showing up to each practice and encouraging other students to show up too were important.

The hours of practice put in during morning tea times, lunchtimes, after school and on weekends paid off as the connection between the group members was amazing. This was especially impressive as they experienced the intense campaign of just six weeks while balancing other priorities including sports and academic commitments. When they hit the ASB Polyfest stage, it appeared as though the members of the ropu were performing as one, not as individuals, and I was so proud of the way they held the stage. Their performance was incredible and prompted three members of the team to be invited to trial for a senior Kapa Haka group campaign - a huge mark of success.

I would like to thank our leaders Manea and Keanu, who especially worked so hard; the time they put in was not just what you saw on stage but the lead-up to that, working with the group offstage and guiding their fellow students. Manea had an extra responsibility as she had to guide the girls in the group. This was the first year in a long time that girls have been included in the Kapa Haka group.

There were only four girls who took to the stage: Tinihuia Lee-Lemon; Tiana Bennett (Year 12, Marion Bruce); Te Aria Nathan (Year 12, Marion Bruce); and Manea, with Esmee Boyes (Year 11, Taylor) also part of the wider group. These students were trying to hold the space where 20 girls would usually perform, so there was extra pressure on them. Their eventual selection and performance on the day was incredible.

In the final weeks before our performance, we relied on support to help prepare the group and organise the noho marae, dress rehearsals and practices, communicating with all those supporting and helping the kaupapa. Thank you to our tutors, kaiako, whānau and students - without all your support it would not have been possible to achieve what we did.

Māori Advisory Committee

Tumutumu parea, rākau parea, kia whānui te ara ki a Tāne - Clear the debris so that the pathway to our aspirations is achievable.

Like the mighty oaks that line the College entrance, the Māori Advisory Committee (MAC) has endured headwinds and shed leaves but continues to grow, develop and provide shelter for Māori in the school.

Pre-pandemic, we essentially had one Māori teacher in the school who came under the languages department, but in 2024 we now have a Te Reo Whiria department which continues to develop and strive to provide leadership to both our taiohi (youth), and learning fraternity, as King's College looks to enhance the education it provides, by being responsive to, and supporting Māori students.

Initially the MAC surveyed, students, teachers, staff and the wider community to uncover what gaps there were, in Māori students achieving as Māori in Kings College. From this a document was formed: Toi te Mana 2022-2025. This living document is the basis of the Te Ao Māori strategy for the school and aspects of it have been introduced into the strategic planning of the school. Giving effect to supporting momentum for King's College to shift and progress the aspirations of Māori students, staff and whānau.

Matariki was an incredible occasion this year, bringing together our students, staff and whānau in a collaborative effort to plan and implement the event. It provided a meaningful opportunity for whanaungatanga (strengthening connections) between our whānau, King's College and King's School. With the latest Dune film recently released, it was a great opportunity for our junior and senior students to hear her speak about the background of the books and the choices made for the film versions.

It may have been 40 years ago, but the tour remains of great interest to our students, many of whom are studying the history of protest movements in New Zealand. Kerry's engaging presentation really brought this history to life.

In 2024, we had the privilege and fortune to host **Michel Tuffery** once again in our department and into our school to impact both our students and our staff.





Technology Department

With a contingent this year of 585 students, the Technology Department continues to go from strength to strength in terms of numbers and with tweaked courses to continually keep ideas and outcomes fluid. The lack of an external examination in the IGCSE course next year will enable us to grow our numbers in 2026 when students realise their IGCSE course will include an architectural component as a point of difference, to allow Year 11 students to sample in greater depth another arm of technology. This also provides an opportunity to grow our already wellestablished Architectural Design courses in Years 12 and 13.

In conjunction with the Art Department, the FUSE expo, under the direction of **Gary Burton** and **Jay Pressnell**, was a highlight and a pointer to where the linking and direction of both departments are heading in the future. Exciting stuff!

Our Technology year groups typically build year-on-year. The Year 9 groups, of which we currently have three rotations through the year, benefitted from the hands-on approach with timber, plastics and electronics work to produce their Bluetooth speakers. Fortunately, we have our Year 10 group all year. More intricate timber and plastic work introduces specific processes that have once again proven to be so useful. Model building along with metal work and lathe use, as well as a significant drawing package, continue to set the scene for the senior years.

Many of the Year 11 girls arrived at the College with strong drawing skills. Like other years, they adapted quickly to the materials and processes on offer. The theme of 'toys and games' was well received by the students, with a wide range produced with the added possibility of donation of these products to those in greater need.

The Year 12 and 13 classes in Architectural Design, Product Design and Building and Construction have produced visually interesting and thoughtful designs and products. The range of materials used in different designs continues to showcase the design process being used to great effect with varied outcomes. The comments from other staff members and parents alike all point to the fact that the standard is so high given that this is the work of high school students.

In the end, both the Technology teaching and technical staff have contributed to another successful year for the students, some of whom embark on their next stage of life while others return in 2025 to continue the legacy of those before them. Next year the further linking of art and technology will really light the 'FUSE'!

Maths Olympiad Club

Fostering Mathematical Excellence

The Maths Olympiad Club has truly thrived in its goal of broadening students' understanding beyond the typical secondary school syllabus. Our weekly lunchtime seminars have seen an impressive turnout, with over 50 enthusiastic mathematicians attending regularly. To enhance the learning experience, we organised the seminars into Junior and Senior groups, enabling students to tackle problems suited to their varying levels of experience.

Areas of Exploration

Under the guidance of dedicated teachers and senior student leaders, including May Meng (Teacher-in-Charge), Jeremy Johnson and students Winston Weng (Year 13, Parnell) and David Li (Year 13, Peart), our club members explored a diverse array of mathematical disciplines. Topics such as number theory, combinatorics, algebra and geometry captivated our participants, fostering a deep interest in problem-solving.

Year-round Competitions

To promote excellence, the club offered preparation for numerous competitions throughout the year: including the NZ Junior Competition; the International Mathematical Modelling Competition; the NZ Senior Competition; Mathex, the Australian Competition; the Auckland Olympiad Competition; and the NZ Olympiad Competition.

Remarkable Achievements

The dedication of our students led to remarkable achievements in the competitions they entered. A standout moment was the selection of two of our students for the prestigious January residential camp, where around 25 of the country's top young mathematicians were invited to participate after two rounds of competitions organised by the NZ Maths Olympiad Committee. This opportunity highlights their exceptional mathematical excellence. In addition, our Year 10 Mathex team demonstrated outstanding teamwork and problem-solving skills, earning 1st place and bringing home the Year 10 Mathex Cup. This victory is particularly significant, as it marks the first time since 2005 that King's has claimed the Cup.

One of our major achievements this year was having four teams compete in the 48Hr Film Competition, known as one of the toughest challenges for filmmakers. Growing from just one team in 2021 to now four teams demonstrates the passion and talent King's students have for storytelling.

In addition to this, the club has been busy creating content for the school, including a promotional video for *Chicago*. Red Nose Day and a promotion for Dance at King's. Aspiring directors have brought their ideas and scripts to the club also, pitched them to our members and moved into production. Student Advisory Panel

The Student Advisory Panel has had a really positive and impactful year. The group has brought some amazing changes to the College community and has really made a difference in school life. At the start of the year, the Panel came up with three aspects of the College that they wanted to make a difference in. This led to the creation of three focus groups, each aiming to improve one aspect of the school – either anti-bullying and bullying awareness, an improved peer tutoring system or greater girl and boy integration.

Group one decided to focus on the issue of anti-bullying and awareness. They wanted to continue the work on anti-bullying through promoting kindness using people's stories. They created a form in which students could anonymously submit their bullying experiences, or where they acted as an upstander against bullying. After receiving an overwhelming amount of submissions, the group decided to create an impactful video, sharing these submissions to show the effect of bullying and how it impacts individuals. This video was shown to all students at Assembly and put up on SchoolBox. In addition, they ran a competition to refresh the See It Say It Stop It anti-bullying campaign the school advertises, aiming to regenerate attention and also usage of the submission forms. We received many creative designs, and three new posters were chosen to be put up around school, to promote speaking up against bullying instead of being a bystander.

Group two focused on the issue of pressures on students, specifically addressing academic pressures and how to improve the school's systems to give students easier access to academic resources, ultimately relieving that pressure. We identified a disconnect between the Learning Centre and House Tutoring and discussed ways to improve this through the tutoring system. The Student Advisory Panel collaborated with the Learning Centre to create a form, accessible on the SchoolBox, allowing students to be paired with a student tutor in any subject they need help with. In addition, students seeking service hours could sign up to tutor others. This aims to streamline the system at King's, making it clear how students can access help. The form has been very successful, and students were able to receive help when needed.

Group three focused on the issue of integration between girls and boys. We discussed how senior boys and girls often struggle to get to know each other initially, so we proposed a new shared common room space, open to both during lunchtimes. Many students go to their Houses during morning tea and lunch break, so this space would give them the option to meet up close to classes, relax, eat and get to know each other. This group has been in meetings with **Mr Simon Lamb** this year and we're making progress. Unfortunately, we weren't able to get the common room running this year due to space issues, but we have plans and discussions in place to open it for students during 2025.

Sport



Head of Sport's Report



Well, it finally happened: we had an uninterrupted sports season. No COVID-19, tropical storms or schoolwide illnesses taking teams out of competitions like we have had over the previous four years. Students could train and play without any major interruptions, enabling them to achieve some phenomenal results.

There were some fantastic team and individual performances across the year from the likes of the Premier Girls' Tennis team and the Senior Boys' 4x400m team being New Zealand Secondary School (NZSS) National Champions. The Premier Golf team was runner-up at the NZSS Nationals along with the Swim team.

It is really pleasing to see the performances of our younger athletes in the likes of Rowing, Cycling, Tennis, Touch, Snow Sports, Badminton, Swimming and Golf with the fantastic results that they have achieved this year, hopefully boding well for future success.

Our younger rowers won gold-medal events at both the North Island and Maadi Championships and the Under-16 Cycling time trial team became National Champions for their age group (bringing the first-ever Cycling title back to the College with them). We have also had success with students becoming National Champions with Ishaan Shah (Year 11, Parnell) NZ Under-16 Golf and Oscar Wu (Year 10, Peart) NZ Under-16 Badminton. We had World Champion Alexander de Lautour (Year 13, Greenbank) competing and winning the World IRB racing title and world record holder Hugo Wigglesworth (Year 13, Major), who soared 36.7m into the air and travelled 274.6 metres before touching down, breaking the previous world record set in August last year in Kiteboard jumping.

Many students have time away from school to compete in their favoured code with parents supporting them as they keep up with their training, competing and school work. As well as those listed above, another example of this is Haydn Fordyce (Year 11, Peart), who, over the past two years, has been racing motorbikes in New Zealand, Australia and Asia. He has now been invited to Spain to compete in the Red Bull MotoGP Rookies Cup where he will go up against the best in the world for his age. There are

many more examples of this across the codes, especially in Golf, Tennis and Snow Sports as the students need to head offshore to attain ranking points or have access to snow.

There were many teams that achieved very good results in the grade that they played in, with the Girls' First XI Football team going through the round-robin part of their competition unbeaten. They are just one example of a team that worked well together on the field.

The Year 13 students, who are finishing this year, are part of the COVID-19 era where they were unable to compete for some time. I'd like to thank those students for the way that they persevered through that difficult period to now have successful and full seasons to complement their academics. The likes of Scott Illerbrun (Year 13, School), who has been in the First XI Hockey team since Year 9, finally getting a win against Auckland Grammar, winning an Auckland title and coming 3rd in New Zealand at the Rankin Cup. He would have missed approximately 20 to 25 games with the two years of pandemic restrictions, so if it wasn't for that, he would have become our most capped First XI player.

The Sports Department welcomed some new staff members in 2024. Late 2023. Ian Robinson was appointed as the First XV Rugby Head Coach. Hayato Yoneto, a nationally ranked sprinter who competed at the Oceania Athletics Championships this year for New Zealand, has joined the Athletic Development team and Old Collegian Pita Alatini (Marsden, 1989–94) has taken over as Head of Rugby. I'd like to thank Charlotte Freeman, Hayden McNulty and Scott Palmer for the successful work they have completed within the sports arena.

King's Athletes Dominate at National Level

In December 2023, the Senior Boys' 4x400m Relay team of Kahu Cotterill (Year 13, School), Joseph Dunn (Averill, 2019–23), Jack Erikson (Year 13, Peart) and James Ford (Parnell, 2019–23) won the National title.

In Term 1, the Girls' Tennis team of Kate Anderson (Year 13, Taylor), Zoe Driscoll (Year 13, Middlemore), Poppy Loutit (Year 13, Marion Bruce) and **Renee Zhang** (Year 13, Marion Bruce) won the NZSS title.

Leo Arrowsmith (Year 13, Parnell) continued his fine form from last year at the NZSS Swimming Champs, where he won four gold and two bronze medals. At the same event, **Danny Sun** (Year 10, Parnell) won two gold, two silver and one bronze. Caden Fuatimau (Year 9, Averill) won two gold medals as well as one silver and one bronze. Finn Aloua (Year 9, Major) won two gold medals and Sebastian Segers (Year 10, Parnell) won one gold, two silver and one bronze also. Other students competed very well so that the team finished 2nd in the country - an outstanding achievement.

King's Athletics and Cross-Country Teams Still Delivering Results

The NZSS Athletics Championships took place in Christchurch in 2023. There were some impressive results with the team winning five gold, five silver and two bronze medals.

The 2024 Cross-Country season saw many strong performances with the Senior Girls' team of Olivia Barron (Year 13, Marion Bruce), Zara Ford (Year 13, Taylor), Ariella Grant (Year 13,

Marion Bruce), Petra Grant (Year 13, Marion Bruce), Gigi Moaveni (Year 13, Marion Bruce) and **Charlotte Ray** (Year 11, Taylor) winning the six-person event at the Auckland Secondary Schools Championships. The Intermediate Boys' team of **Quinn Moss** (Year 12, Parnell), Samuel Rickerby (Year 11, Peart) and **Quinn Winwood** (Year 11, Parnell) came 2nd in the three-person team at the same event, with Samuel contributing with a 1st place in the Individual category.

At the NZSS Cross-Country Champs, Samuel Rickerby ran a fantastic race in his first year in the Senior ranks to finish 3rd. Redd Scampion (Year 12, Major) ran very well also, to finish 13th. Both boys were selected for the NZSS Cross-Country team that competed in Australia.

The Auckland Secondary Schools Road Race Championships saw Samuel Rickerby come 2nd in the Intermediate Boys and Redd Scampion finish 3rd in the Senior Boys' race.

The Senior Girls' team of Zara Ford, Ariella Grant, Petra Grant, Jemma Nesdale (Year 12, Taylor), Evee Tan (Year 11, Taylor) and Renee Zhang (Year 13, Marion Bruce) won the three-person and the six-person teams race.

King's Teams Win Auckland Titles

- The Premier Boys' Touch team won a gripping extratime final to take out the championship against Auckland Grammar.
- The First XI Boys' Hockey team won the Premier grade a fantastic result for the team.
- Leo Bamfield (Year 13. Major) and Oliver Scott (Year 13. Peart) won the U19 Boys' teams event in the Duathlon.
- In Snow Sports, the girls' team won the Auckland Secondary Schools title after great results at Snowplanet.
- The Senior Boys' 200m Freestyle Relay Swimming team won a tight race to be crowned champions.

Another Memorable Year of the King's House **Sports Competition**

One of the sporting highlights at King's each year is the inter-House Sports competition. The different events provide the opportunity for students to bond in their House groups and the inter-House rivalry is fierce.

This year was no different to any other, with strong competition and no quarter given in any of the different events that were completed.

The Athletics was of a similarly high standard. It was a close-run event in most grades but the consistent top-four placings across all categories allowed Selwyn House to take the overall Athletics title by a comfortable margin. Taylor House won the girls' title.

In the other whole-school event, the Cross-Country Championship, it was School House who prevailed on the day. The girls' title was won by Middlemore House.

There were undoubtedly more chances for students to take part in sports for their House during 2024. The race for the title of the champion House came down to the Football and Rugby results as these were the last two sports played.

In the end, however, it was School House who prevailed over Parnell House to win the competition.

The Girls' House Sport title was fiercely contested also, with Middlemore House winning it this year.

New Zealand Secondary Schools Athletics Championships (NZSSAC) 2023 8-10 December

A hot and windy first two days of competition in Christchurch set some challenging conditions for the athletes. The southerly wind and rain on the morning of the final day brought further challenges but all athletes presevered and did their best. There were some outstanding results from the event with others setting personal bests while competing against the best in the country.

- Suzie Kennelly (Middlemore, 2021-23) after sustaining a knee injury the Monday before the championships she threw outstandingly well to get the silver medal in the Senior Girls Discus with a throw of 45.17m which set a new school record. She also claimed a silver in the Shot-put with a distance of 14.00m.
- Leala Willman (Marion Bruce, 2021-23) threw well in the Senior Girls Javelin and achieved a silver medal.
- Zara Ford made the final of the Senior Girls 800m and achieved a well-run 5th place.
- Sophie Sones (Marion Bruce, 2021–23) made the semi-finals of the Senior Girls 100m Hurdles and was 13th in the very competitive Long Jump competition.
- James Ford (Parnell, 2019–23) was a young man on a mission wanting to be the first athlete to complete the Senior Boys 400m/800m double at the NZ Secondary Schools Championships twice after being the first to achieve it the previous year. He once again managed to attain this by winning the 400m in 47.99s (a new school record) and the 800m in 2:02.04 - a phenomenal effort that involved qualifying through heats, semi-finals and then racing finals for
- Joseph Dunn (Averill, 2019–23) won the Senior Boys 110m Hurdles in a dominating run. Joseph's time of 14.03s set a new school record.
- Quinn Moss (Year 12, Parnell) ran well in an extremely fast Junior Boys 800m final to win in an excellent time of 1:59.92.
- Kahu Cotterill came 2nd, behind James in the Senior Boys 400m, running a great time of 49.14s.
- Jack Burns (Year 10, Peart) threw outstandingly well having to move up a discus weight to finish 2nd with a throw of 46.96m. This was a personal best for Jack.
- Jonty Batchelor qualified well in the Junior Boys 800m and ran a well-timed final to finish 3rd with a time of 2:00.71. This set a new Junior Boys school record - an excellent achievement for his first time at the champs.
- Alex Lister (Year 11, Parnell) was a late entry into the Junior Boys Long Jump after a long recovery from injury and finished a creditable 6th with a jump of 5.68m.
- Sacha Foenander (Year 13, School) was attending his first champs and unfortunately (fouled out) in the Senior Boys Long Jump. He finished 9th in the Senior Boys Triple Jump.
- Samuel Burton (Year 13, Peart) finished 11th in the Senior Boys High Jump and 12th in the Senior Boys Triple Jump.
- Jack Erikson finished down the field in an extremely quick Senior Boys 1500m.

- Quinn Winwood (Year 11, Parnell) completed the first round of the Junior Boys 800m but unfortunately failed to move through to the semi-finals.
- Charlie Barron (Year 10, Marsden) ran in the Year 9 3000m Road Race and finished 44th in a time of 11:21.77, which was a personal best.
- Thomas Rhodes (Year 10, Greenbank) competed in the Year 9 3000m Road Race too and finished in 47th position with a time of 11:27.45, which was a personal best for Thomas.
- **Redd Scampion** (Year 12, Major) was in great form leading into the champs but unfortunately caught a virus and could not compete on the day.
- The Senior Mixed 4x400m relay team of Sophie, Zara, Quinn Moss and Jonty finished 3rd with a time of 3min 54.70s. This is the first time we have had a mixed relay team at the NZSSAC. so this set a new school record.

We are extremely pleased with the Girls First XI's performances in Term 1, which is very encouraging for the future of Girls Cricket at King's College under the coaching and management team of Mr Norris and Annie Mein.

One notable individual highlight was Kate Illerburn scoring 114 not out for Parnell Reserves. By all accounts, it was an amazing spectacle to watch her persevere through the innings.

Term 1 Cricket Selection Process

The selection process for juniors in Term 1 was one of the most challenging we've faced in a long time. We experienced delays in students selecting co-curricular sports and only had 10 days to complete the process. I can only thank the coaches and managers of both senior and junior teams for their tremendous effort in achieving the selection process at short notice.

I would like to commend the junior teams' selection and trials. We held four net sessions and two trial matches in the short leadin time of 10 days. Matt Kidd, James Alvis and Paresh Vallabh, the three coaches, managed to select three afternoon teams and two T20 morning teams despite the challenges.

We also faced the huge challenge of selecting the senior teams with only 10 days lead-in to the start of Term 1 Cricket competitions. For the senior school team selection, the First XI played two warm-up matches against Mount Maunganui College and Macleans College. We trialled 18 students from the First and Second XI, and the fringe Second and Third XI players were evaluated during team training sessions.

Boys' First XI

The First XI had a positive start to the season, with some very good results in both 50-over and T20 competitions. The Second XI and Third XI, like the First XI, had mixed results, narrowly losing a couple of close matches. A positive from these teams performances is that we are pleased with the progress of the younger players, who are having their first taste of playing senior Cricket, which is very encouraging for the future. By the end of Term 1, all three teams were well-placed in their respective competitions, and with improved team performances, they could be contending for finals in Term 4.

CrossFit

At King's College we are proudly continuing to lead the way with the provision of weekly CrossFit sessions for Year's 11-13 students throughout the year. We were the first school in New Zealand to become a registered CrossFit affiliate (there are currently only two), which means we can offer our students a quality programme under the guidance of CrossFit qualified and experienced coaches, all driven by the passion of Teacher-in-Charge Wally Rifle.

CrossFit encourages a healthy lifestyle through exercise incorporating a variety of functional movements performed at high intensity. It includes ever-changing workouts which challenge our students (and staff at the staff sessions that are also provided) with movements that comprise aspects of gymnastics, weightlifting, running, rowing and more! The benefits are not just physical but help participants to also develop a healthy mind-set and a strong sense of community, all of which is encouraged at King's.

At the end of the 2023 year, we extended this offer to our junior students as well enabling them to have the opportunity to try CrossFit and learn some of the key movements. We are really looking forward to seeing some of those students back again in their senior years!

We are particularly impressed with a number of students who have shown incredible commitment by attending classes every term for the last three years. The progress they have made has been inspirational and a true reflection of the hard work that they put in each and every week.

As one of our students has reported: "CrossFit forms an environment where progression is the goal - not to reach a certain level but to create a new level for yourself. At CrossFit you are simply striving to be a faster, stronger and smarter person than you were last time."

Last year saw two teams of students participate for the first time in the College Games. They achieved great results and, most importantly, worked incredibly well in their teams to support one another in each of the challenging workouts throughout the day. Participating again this year, our students are proud to be able to represent the College in this annual national event, which is unique to New Zealand with around 200 student athletes from various high schools and gyms competing.

Cycling

The 2024 season kicked off with an intake of novice riders who completed their induction programme during Term 1. From this, four new Year 9 riders were added to the racing squad for the winter season. There were no girls in the racing squad this year, which was unfortunate.

Oliver Scott (Year 13, Peart) was appointed captain of cycling and was a superb role model to the whole squad, completing both a successful racing season himself and encouraging the younger members of the squad. As a result of Oliver's success this year, particularly his performance in the Tour de l'Abitibi in July, he earned himself a development contract at one of the French professional teams, which he will take up in 2025.

The team time trials (TTT) season was split between races at Pukekohe Raceway and a road course at Otaua. Results were mixed throughout the season – the Senior A team was never quite able to make an impact throughout the year and didn't feature on the podium at any stage. The Junior A team showed immense promise and was generally on the podium or thereabouts without ever quite realising their true potential.

Results at the July North Island Championships held at Lake Karāpiro were limited to some individual successes – Oliver Scott finished 3rd in the U20 road race and 2nd in the U20 criterium. **Will McAteer** (Year 12, Major) finished 3rd in the U20 B criterium, and **William Glover** (Year 12, Peart) finished 2nd in the U17 B criterium.

At the Northern Tour, held in Auckland in September, there was another string of strong results, with Oliver Scott finishing 1st in the individual time trials (ITT), 1st in the criterium and 1st overall in the U20 General Classification (GC). In the U16 grade **Cole Feringa** (Year 10, Peart) finished 3rd in the ITT, 2nd in the criterium and 3rd in the GC. In the U15 grade, **Hugh Henshaw** (Year 9, Peart) finished 3rd in the hill climb, 2nd in the criterium and 2nd in the GC, while **Levi Atkinson** (Year 9, Major) finished 2nd in the U15 B criterium.

This year Road Nationals were held in Timaru at the beginning of the Term 3 holidays. This was the first South Island event for six years due to cancellations during the years of pandemic interruptions. After a strong Northern Tour and another block of good training the squad had high expectations leading into this event.

As it transpired, those expectations were well founded as the squad recorded its best results at Nationals, with the undoubted highlight being the U16 TTT Championship win by the U16 Junior A team, winning the Paul Matthews Cup, consisting of **Charlie Barron** (Year 10, Marsden), Cole Feringa, **Luke Herbert** (Year 10, Peart) and **Riley Hoon** (Year 10, Peart). To put this in perspective, King's has never notched a podium at Nationals in either senior or junior division before, let alone win the title.

In the individual events, the other highlight was Hugh Henshaw's victory in the U15 points race, also winning a National title. On top of that Hugh also finished 3rd in the U15 road race to complete a very successful event for him personally. All of the squad acquitted themselves brilliantly and while the winners received the notoriety, these successes were built on the strong team dynamics and a willingness to sacrifice personal ambitions for those of their team-mates.

The squad was again coached by **Hunter Deavoll** (Major, 2015–19), and the results at Nationals were a rich reward for the





countless hours he has spent training with the teams. Hunter is finishing up this season and leaves big shoes to fill. The King's College Cycling Committee seamlessly organised training and racing behind the scenes – without this parental support it would be impossible to compete successfully in this sport.

Mountain Biking

The 2024 Mountain Biking season kicked off in early March and it was good to see the majority of our riders return for another year along with a new addition from the Year 9 cohort.

Our 2024 team consisted of the following riders: **Boston** Chandler (Year 10, Major), Cole Feringa (Year 10, Peart), Dane Hickman (Year 11, Major), Hugh Henshaw (Year 9, Peart), captain Kobe Purchase (Year 13, School) and Rocco Van Velzen (Year 10, Marsden). The season included a total of six races, with five rounds of Auckland Secondary Schools Cross-Country races, as well as the North Island Champs in Rotorua.

The first round of the series was held at Riverhead Forest on Sunday 10 March. Due to a clash with the 440 Gravity Enduro, Cole Feringa was the sole King's rider in this race, but he did us proud, coming away with 2nd place. Hugh Henshaw placed 1st in the Under-14 440 Enduro category and Kobe Purchase placed 3rd in the Under-19 category.

The second round of the series was hosted at Hūnua Regional Park on Sunday 5 May. Hūnua is notorious for its harsh terrain and deadly clay. It was raining heavily on the day, just like last year, which made the 22km race feel extremely long - especially on the slippery surface.

The third round was held on 23 June at Totara Park. This round consisted of very wet conditions too. Totara Park is a recently developed small bike park with rather flat trails, suitable for Cross-Country races such as this.

The fourth round of the series was at a slippery Waitawa Regional Park on Sunday 4 August. Cole Feringa and Dane Hickman both braved the conditions to head out and represent King's but, unfortunately, had to pull out partway through the race due to injury and illness.

The final round of the Cross-Country series was to be hosted at Woodhill Mountain Bike Park at the end of August, but due to track conditions, it was delayed until Sunday 1 September, back at Riverhead. This round was held during bleak weather also and the riders completed either two or three laps of a 7km loop (depending on their age category).

As well as the Auckland Secondary Schools races, the North Island Champs was a great opportunity for our riders to get some racing in. Held over three days (17-19 March), this race was hosted in The Redwoods, Rotorua. There was a range of races on offer, including Cross-Country, Enduro and Downhill. King's was well represented at this race, with all our riders participating and while there weren't any notable results, everyone gave it their best.

Thank you to all the parents for their ongoing support throughout the season and, in particular, Mr Brett Hickman, for the leading role he played this year.

Football

Success, Growth and New Opportunities!

The 2024 football season was the biggest and best in recent memory for King's, with more teams representing the College, more students participating, and some achievements to celebrate!

For the first time in many years, King's College fielded three Senior teams, with many students embracing football as an excellent social sporting option at the College. And for the first time, we had three girls' teams competing in inter-school competitions! In Term 1 we entered six teams into the Northern Region Football Inter-school Futsal competition, with three topthree finishes! Our Boys' First XI overcame a mid-season hump to finish a respectable 3rd place in A1, and our Girls' First XI went the entire College Sport Auckland season unbeaten, only for the heartbreak of losing their finals on penalties. Both our Boys' and Girls' First XI teams also did well at their respective National tournaments.

Our Junior teams all benefitted from a vast amount of coaching, development and growth this year. Our 13A team was coached by **Mike Stewart**, returning from several years' hiatus after a successful period coaching the Boys' First XI in the early 2000s. Our 14A team was coached by new staff member Sam Bottomley, who joined the team having previously played National League himself. Renowned Pacific footballing legend Coach Henry Fa'arodo provided additional coaching to all the Year 9 and Year 10 students through the popular Friday Skill Development sessions and through other coaching initiatives. Throughout the season, individual improvement and skill acquisition were evident in all our Year 9 and Year 10 students. although this did not always transfer to team results. An array of guest coaches contributed to this improvement of individual skill in our youngest students, with Skill Development sessions throughout the year being delivered by ex-Chelsea Academy coach Jess Ibrom, Former All White Monty Paterson, King's Prep First XI coach Nick Chudzynski and former professional and Argentinian representative **Lautaro Reinoso**, to name but a few. The great range and quality of coaching we were able to provide our youngest students this year will pay off in the future as they continue playing for years to come.

Our 15A side was coached by another new staff member, Jay Pressnell, who joined the College from Pukekohe High School, where he had previously coached the Boys' First XI. Due to the number of Year 11 students who shared their commitment between 15A and the Boys' First XI side, some of the team's performances were inconsistent, with some good results recorded, including a great victory against Auckland Grammar, but also falling to some hard-fought defeats against some of the top teams in the division. The 15A team progressed deep into the play-offs for their division but were ultimately unable to claim their title. Our 15B side had an enjoyable season and progressed deep into the play-offs in their division, unfortunately losing by a single goal in the final to finish runners-up in the B1 competition.

The Girls' First XI was coached again by Vaughan Mitchell and managed by **Mallory Bish**. The team played in the Auckland Senior A2 competition against a mix of First XI teams from smaller schools and Second XI teams from bigger football schools. With many experienced Year 13 players this season, combined with some dynamic new Year 11 and Year 12 students, the season was a story of emphatic wins and hard-fought draws,

ultimately going the entire season unbeaten and conceding very few goals. They fought a tight race against Green Bay High School to finish top of the competition on both points and goal difference! Unfortunately, a draw would not do in the finals and after extra time a dreaded penalty shoot-out stood in the way of our girls claiming a title. Despite falling at the final hurdle, our girls' side was the toast of the College, with a large crowd turning out to watch their final match. They carried on their strong form at Nationals, beating several teams from higher divisions and out of Auckland on the way to a top-10 finish, one of their best Nationals results since the famous Kathy Seaward Cup win in 2018.

The Boys' First XI won their early play-off against Pakuranga College and retained their place in the Auckland Senior A1 competition. With a large group of players with experience from the 2023 season and some exciting new additions, the season started positively, the most notable highlight being the 2-nil win over Auckland Grammar at home. Unfortunately a series of injuries, illnesses and absences for international duties drastically impacted the squad and limited the number of players available for key mid-season matches. After the disappointing mid-season slump, a strong run of late-season results saw the team finish in 3rd place, just missing out on the opportunity for a chance of promotion to the Premier Division. Like the Girls' First XI, our boys carried their strong run of form into Nationals and were able to move through the group stage unbeaten and ended up in the final, winning 1-nil against local favourites Tawa College to claim the Trident Trophy, a National Division 2 title, and the College's first-ever Boys' National title.

Our Senior B boys' team, the Second XI, was coached by the very experienced and well-respected **Daniel Simunic**. Despite struggling occasionally for player numbers, they had a great string of results and finished 4th in their division, unfortunately missing out on reaching the final. Our Senior C boys' team, The Maroons, was coached by returning Old Collegians Fred Balle (St John's, 2019-23) and Ani Menon Vinod (School, 2021-23) playing in the Senior C competition. Our newest team, the Senior D boys' team, was affectionately referred to as Team Mana. They had a relatively successful inaugural season, with a great run of results late in the season giving them entry to the play-offs for their division but unfortunately falling in the semi-finals. The Girls' Second XI team played in the Senior B girls' competition and had a mixed season of results but built a strong and enjoyable team environment as they progressed through their season. Our other newest team, our Girls' Third XI, played in the truncated girls' Senior C competition, only running during Term 2. They all enjoyed their first experience of school football, and we will look to ensure they have an even better experience

Our annual House Football tournaments took place in a new aligned format this year, with the Junior and Senior competitions both being played on a Saturday morning. There was a great 'Festival of Football' atmosphere, and the day was well attended by students and families. The Senior Boys' House Football competition saw top seeds and 2023 winners Greenbank scrape into the final, before losing 2-nil to 2nd-seed Parnell, with a stack of young talent seeing Parnell through with two great goals in the final moments of the game. In the Junior House Football competition, it was an all-boarders final, with 2nd-seed Selwyn up against surprise finalists and 9th-seed School House. In a true

battle of precision against power, it was Selwyn who scored first, before School bundled the ball over the line to tie the match. It was a moment of brilliance in the dying stages of the game that saw Selwyn pull a goal ahead, and go on to win the game, 2-1. Our Girls' House Football competition was played earlier in the term, with Marion Bruce coming out on top overall after Middlemore and Taylor ground out a hard-fought draw in the round-robin-style competition.

Also featured on the College calendar was the eagerly anticipated Staff vs Prefects football match. Played in the final week of Term 3, this lunchtime spectacle was tightly contested, with some inspired performances and valiant efforts from the far more composed and controlled staff team no match for the bullish, athletic Prefects side, with the Prefects running out dubious 2-nil winners.

The King's College Institute of Sport and Athletic Performance class were a welcome supplement to the standard team training for selected students again this year, with almost 25 football students benefitting from these individual sessions regularly throughout the year. Coach Henry Fa'arodo is the highest-capped Solomon Islands footballer of all time, with a professional and international career spanning nearly 20 years. His vast playing and coaching experience was a welcomed and appreciated addition to the football programme this year.

Our Year 13 Leavers' celebrations were a great series of events again, starting with the traditional clapping out of the Year 13 students at the last Boys' First XI home match of the season. A decent crowd gathered to watch the team battle to victory against Northcote College, which was followed by a football luncheon for our football community to come together to acknowledge and celebrate the achievements and contributions of our Boys' and Girls' First XI Year 13 students.

A new addition to the 2024 football programme saw 13 futsal teams take part in inter-school competitions here in Auckland over Terms 1 and 4. Futsal has recently become a College Sport Auckland-sanctioned sport, and King's is among the first to open this pathway to our students. With opportunities for both social and competitive futsal, we've seen an increase in demand and look forward to growth in 2025. We had three futsal teams finish top three in their respective competitions, and one championship-winning team in Term 4.

At Football Prize-giving, the 2024 recipient of the 'Duggan Award for Outstanding Service to Football' was **Sebastian** Bhatnagar (Year 13, Marsden). Throughout his time at the College, Sebastian has contributed over 100 service hours to the football programme, through coaching and refereeing junior teams. Other notable award-winners at the Football Prize-giving were the top goalscorer awards, with Zoe Davis-Calvert (Year 12, Taylor) winning the award for the Girls' First XI with 18 goals, and Jack Hernon (Year 13, Selwyn), winner of the Boys' First XI award for the third consecutive year with 26 goals! Jack Hernon received the J McL Smith Cup for 2024 Boys' First XI Most Valuable Player also, while **Sophia Hoffman** (Year 12, Marion Bruce) was the inaugural winner of the newly donated Davis-Calvert Family Trophy for Girls' Most Valuable Player.

Another 2024 addition to the football programme is the way that football achievements are recognised, via football-specific badges. These are worn on the student blazer like any other

award. The first badge is the Football Merit badge. This is awarded to students for either:

- 1. Continuous participation in school football throughout all the school years during their time at King's College (Boys: Years 9-13; Girls: Years 11-13).
- 2. Excellent achievements in football.

- Jack Hernon (Boys' First XI) for the achievement of 50 goals in inter-school competition over three seasons for the Boys' First XI.

The second recognition badge is the First XI 25 Appearances badge. This is awarded to students who appear (have playing time) in 25 competitive fixtures for the Boys' or Girls' First XI. This is limited to Auckland inter-school matches (including play-offs), National Tournament Week and traditional matches or exchanges (I.e. the Morris-Kelly Cup). It is almost impossible for students to achieve this in just one regular season; this means that a level of commitment and consistency over at least two seasons is required to achieve this. Any student who reaches the impressive feat of 50 matches for Boys' or Girls' First XI is issued a second 25-match badge. The inaugural list of recipients is extensive as we took into consideration the appearances made by current Boys' and Girls' First XI players in previous seasons. However, I want to particularly highlight **Siena Grayson** (Year 13, Taylor), Jack Hernon and Ben Lawson (Year 12, Greenbank), who all received their second 25 Appearances badge for reaching the milestone of 50 competitive matches for Boys' or Girls' First XI and Isaac **Stredder** (Year 10, Parnell), who benefitted from a uniquely packed Boys' First XI schedule to receive his 25 Appearances badge in just his first season in the Boys' First XI.

On behalf of all our King's College teams, players, parents and supporters, the College would like to express its gratitude to every staff member and student who coached or managed teams, particularly for their high levels of commitment, enthusiasm and professionalism throughout the season.

To all the Year 13 players who will be leaving King's this year, thank you! Thank you for choosing to play football and futsal; thank you for your input and your efforts for The Castle and Crown.

Best wishes for your future journey and we hope you find a way to keep enjoying football and futsal and stay connected with King's College Football, wherever you may end up in the world.

Boys' First XI

Auckland 'Almost' and National Success

The Boys' First XI season had a uniquely early start, due to the Al play-off matches being held in early April. Training space and player availability were initial challenges, but regardless, great momentum was built, and despite some nerves, the first leg of the play-off resulted in a thumping 5-nil win. In a sign of things to come, emblematic team captain **Jack Hernon** (Year 13, Selwyn) led the way from start to finish, and scored two of his impressive 24-goal haul! In the second leg, with some injuries and complacency with the play-off almost a sealed deal, Pakuranga College surprised us with a 1-nil loss, but, of course, it was not enough and we progressed to the A1 Championship for 2024.

The first three weeks of the season saw us carry on our impressive performance from the first play-off match, either dominating our opponents or showing strength and courage to come back from goals behind to win all of our opening matches and claim 12 points from four games! Most significant and memorable in this opening month was our 2-nil win over Auckland Grammar School in front of a home crowd at the College. This is the first time King's First XI has beaten Grammar in almost 10 years and is a sign of the growth of the quality of football recently at King's.

In these opening weeks, a few students made their Boys' First XI debuts, including Ryan Rickit (Year 12, School), Dylan Naicker (Year 11, Parnell), Isaac Stredder (Year 10, Parnell) and Spencer Wharfe (Year 10, School), and all contributed handsomely to our opening results. Spencer was particularly impressive with four goals and two assists in three games, before suffering a horrific injury that saw him sidelined until Nationals at the end of the year.

Unfortunately, Spencer's injury and absence was not an exception, with another seven players missing games with injury and illness during the early and middle parts of the season. Notably, the ordinarily sound and reliable Alexander Bhatnagar (Year 12, Marsden) fractured his thumb and was replaced in goal by his brother, **Sebastian Bhatnagar** (Year 13, Marsden). In addition, there were two students who were absent due to international duty: Zar Heather-Rau (Year 12, St John's), who played for the Cook Islands in the FIFA U17 World Cup Qualifiers. and Johnson Belle (Year 12, Selwyn), who played for Papua New Guinea in the FIFA U20 World Cup Qualifiers.

These injuries, illnesses and absences left us struggling to fill positions and build consistency throughout the remainder of Term 2. During that time, we lost the next four matches and dropped closer to the bottom of the table. This was an uncomfortable position, with the memory of our recent A1 play-off still fresh in mind and certainly not a fair reflection of our excellent start to the season. Despite the poor run of results, there were moments of excellence and pure class, which was really exciting to see. The team knew they were able to compete with or outplay these teams; they just needed the consistency and patience to rebuild and make it happen.

We reached a low point in our return match against Auckland Grammar, on the final day of Term 2. With several players injured and ill and even more choosing to depart early for the holiday breaks, our depth was severely tested. This match saw

the introduction of youngster **Jack Kelly** (Year 9, Parnell), who had been attending some training sessions with the Boys' First XI in the weeks leading up to the match. His 10-minute cameo was sound, and he will be a player to watch in the future. Other players who contributed to the Boys' First XI during our tough period in Term 2, covering gaps in the line-up, were: Christian Balle (Year 12, St John's), Reuben Clancy (Year 12, St John's) and Oscar Shuttleworth (Year 12, Marsden).

After the holiday break, the team welcomed back several players from illness and injury - most significantly, Morgan Wright (Year 13, Greenbank), who had spent almost two years sidelined after surgery for a knee injury. Morgan's arrival coincided with Alex's return from injury and was a welcome boost to a consistently hard-working but fatigued backline of **Angus Birchenough** (Year 11, Marsden), **Ben Lawson** (Year 12, Greenbank) and **Isaac** Stredder (Year 10, Parnell). Up until this point, these three had played a full game every match.

With more flexibility and support in defence, and a full complement of attackers and midfielders to select from, we quickly regained form and confidence, and collected another 12 points from our remaining games. In that time, we only lost once to eventual league winners Macleans College. While finishing 3rd in A1 is noteworthy, the team was left ruing the lost points that slipped away during our mid-season slump, with the gap between ourselves and Auckland Grammar in 2nd place not insurmountable to close. As a sign of this renewed and confident Boys' First XI, Zar Heather-Rau and Johnson Belle returned from international duty and contributed eight goals and 12 assists between them during the rest of the year. Another player who had an incredible late season was Josh Motion (Year 11, Parnell), who showed versatility, composure and aptitude across both central defence midfield and centre attacking midfield and excelled at both, particularly during Nationals, where he was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player.

Nationals in Wellington was an incredible week away. The team faced a packed playing schedule, awful weather conditions, and some inconsistency in officiating but played with control and

composure throughout. Leo Bamfield (Year 13, Major) provided stability in the midfield and was selected for the tournament team for his efforts. Impressively, it was several of our youngest players who made some of the biggest contributions at Nationals, with Alex Young (Year 10, Major) scoring in the guarter-final and deputising at striker in the final; Dylan Naicker playing with increased confidence and quality; Spencer Wharfe making his return to the squad with a goal and two assists; **Jayden Wang** (Year 11, Peart), Angus Birchenough and Isaac Stredder all putting in maximum effort, regardless of what position they were playing; and **Lucca Stredder** (Year 11, Parnell) collecting several assists and scoring two crucial goals, the first in our 1-nil win over St Peter's College in the group stage. But the stuff of legends, a goal for the ages, was Lucca's goal in the final. It was an absolute cracker from a distance, with his weak foot, late in stoppage time as we defeated local favourites Tawa College 1-nil to claim the Trident Trophy - the National Division 2 title.

The J Mcl Smith Cup for Boys' First XI Most Valuable Player and the DF Sing Trophy for Golden Boot were won by Jack Hernon, while Josh Motion and Zar Heather-Rau shared the de Latour Trophy for Most Improved Players, after their brilliant mid/late-season form. Isaac Stredder had his reliable efforts recognised, winning the De Tourettes Family Trophy for Most Consistent Player.

A key contributor to the success of the team this year, particularly at Nationals, was our team manager, Robyn Wright. I speak on behalf of the team when I say we are extremely grateful for her efforts and insights, and her manner and character around the team. Further appreciation from myself to Michelle Farmouth, Sports Coordinator, and Kerry Baker, Director of Sports, for their support of football, and Hayato Yoneto and Craig Birkbeck, for supporting the athletic development of our football students.

Golf

It has been another incredibly successful year for King's College Golf, with the Premier and Second teams winning their respective leagues in the College Sport competition. In addition, our outstanding captain, Grace Zhan (Year 13, Marion Bruce) heads to the USA to continue her golf. Our Premier team secured a silver medal in the New Zealand Secondary Schools final in New Plymouth, losing out by one shot over the two days.

The Premier team of Chloe Lam (Year 13, Marion Bruce), Rianne Li (Year 13, Marion Bruce), Ishaan Shah (Year 11, Parnell), Ryan **Xie** (Year 12, Averill) and Grace Zhan won 80% of their games in the nine-hole Auckland Championships to comfortably top their group. They then went on to play Pinehurst School in the semi-finals, before meeting Saint Kentigern College in the finals, who they comfortably beat 219-225. This is the second year we have won this competition. Ishaan Shah produced the putt of his life on the last hole of the New Plymouth Golf Course, winning the Under-16 Championship. Grace Zhan came 2nd in her competition and Ryan Xie 3rd in his (Ryan previously held the U16 Championship but now plays in the U19).



Following trials at the end of Term 1, we were ready to field nine senior teams.

- Watching Hoofdklasse Men's match HDM vs Rotterdam in The Hague.
- Watching Belgium Men's Honours League match Leopold vs Oree in Brussels.

Boys' First XI

The Boys' Hockey First XI can be proud of their 2024 campaign, winning the Auckland Super City Championship for the first time since 2014 and claiming bronze medals at the Rankin Cup, New Zealand Hockey's top-ranking secondary schoolboys' tournament. The team only lost twice all season, winning 23 of its 26 matches, scoring 124 goals and only conceding 25.

As legendary American football coach Vince Lombardi once said: "Individual commitment to a group effort - that's what makes a team work" and this was the secret of the team's success in 2024. The team focused on moving the ball quickly and not running with the ball; the simplicity of their game allowed the team to find its best form and play to its strengths. It was a marked improvement from the 2023 season where the team finished 4th in the Super City and 18th in New Zealand.

With 16 players returning from the 2023 campaign including nine Year 13 students, hopes were high for the team, which was excellently captained by Tom Migounoff, coached by Keith Rowley and managed by Mark Johnston. Pre-season victories over Saint Kentigern College (3-2) and Pukekohe High School (6-1) gave the team a solid foundation and the team recorded emphatic victories over St Peter's College (5-nil) and Takapuna Grammar School (13-nil) in the opening games of the Auckland competition. The first real test was the team's third match against St Kent's and we got off to an outstanding start, scoring in only the second minute. Ben Wigmore weaved his way through the St Kent's defence and slipped the ball to Scott Illerbrun, who swept the ball home. King's added a second goal only nine minutes later when Scott Illerbrun won the ball in the midfield and played a one-two with **Tim Hamilton** (Year 13, Marsden), before advancing into the circle and rifling the ball home. St Kent's pulled a goal back in the second half and then missed a penalty stroke, but King's held on for an important victory. Two further comfortable wins followed against Kristin School (7-1) and St Paul's Collegiate (7-nil) in the annual exchange in Hamilton.

The first competition game against Auckland Grammar in any season is played for the annual Birchall Shield but King's had not won this game since 2015, so was keen to turn the tables on their arch-rivals. The team put in a superb performance, drawing 2-all in a thrilling match in Mt Eden that was an excellent example of schoolboy Hockey. In the first half, King's dominated the match and did not allow Grammar time on the ball. Five minutes into the second quarter the deadlock was broken. It was Tim Hamilton who grabbed the goal when he neatly deflected Scott Illerbrun's pass at a penalty corner high into the net. King's continued to dominate the first half with some scintillating Hockey and Scott Illerbrun made it 2-nil with a low penalty corner flick in the second half. The team pushed hard for a third but Grammar fought back well, reducing the deficit to 2-1 with a scrappy goal in the 36th minute. A fiercely competitive match ensued with the game switching from end to end before, with five minutes remaining, Grammar levelled the scores at 2-all. In the last minute, King's had a chance to score a dramatic winner, but the chance was spurned and the honours were even - so, as defending champions, Grammar held onto the Shield for another year.

A last-second penalty corner strike by Scott Illerbrun earned King's a dramatic 1-all away draw against Whangārei Boys' High School in the annual exchange in June before a 7-1 demolition of Rosmini College continued the unbeaten season.

Two opportunist goals from Tim Hamilton accounted for highflying Westlake Boys in an excellent performance that showed that the team had learnt from the Grammar match how to close off a game and then a 6-1 success over the very defensive St Peter's meant that the team had gone through the first term unbeaten to sit at the top of the table for the Auckland Super City competition.

Term 3 saw the team continue their winning ways with wins over Takapuna (10-nil) and Kristin School (6-nil) before the team earned a crucial 2-nil victory against Auckland Grammar at home with a penalty corner brace from Scott Illerbrun. For the Year 13 students in the team, it was the only time in their five years at King's that they had beaten Auckland Grammar.

After the euphoria of the victory over Grammar, the team was brought back down to earth with a bump as St Kent's ended King's unbeaten record and gave King's a lesson in mental preparedness, going down to a disappointing 2-4 loss. It was a disjointed and untidy performance by the team, who did not adjust to the bumpy field at Lloyd Elsmore Park and made many uncharacteristic errors and turnovers. The defeat was a wake-up call for King's, who learnt from the harsh lesson for the rest of the season.

Rosmini College was crushed 13-nil in the next game including six goals for Scott Illerbrun and four for Tim Hamilton, which sent King's into their final match against 2nd-placed Westlake needing a point to get into the final of the Super City competition for the first time since 2016. The team was hit by sickness and injury and didn't start well but showed some great resilience, digging in to fight back from a goal down and grab the important goal to earn the point needed to finish top of the pool after the round-robin. From a long corner, **Ed Irvine**'s (Year 13, Greenbank) pass found the unmarked Tim Hamilton in the circle and his smart turn and shot beat the goalkeeper to level the scores and draw the game.

Auckland Super City Final

Spurred on by the excellent support from the crowd, two goals from Scott Illerbrun, both in the first quarter, gave the First XI an emphatic 2-nil victory over St Kent's at Lloyd Elsmore Park to win the Auckland Super City Championship for the first time since 2014. For the team, it was the ultimate performance when it mattered, putting in an outstanding and dominating effort on the night, not allowing their opposition a shot on target or a penalty corner in the whole game. After losing to St Kent's a fortnight before, their first loss of the season, the team knew that they would have to put in a markedly improved performance if they were to win the title and they did not disappoint. The effort, commitment and game management was of the highest standard and King's was the deserved winner. King's got off to an excellent start, stunning their opponents with a goal in the first minute. An aggressive press on the St Kent's backline saw Scott Illerbrun steal the ball off a defender, exchange passes with Tim Hamilton and then rocket the ball low into the corner to put King's 1-nil up. In the seventh minute, it was 2-nil to King's. From a penalty corner, Tim Hamilton's shot was prevented from crossing the line by a defender's body and Scott Illerbrun coolly stepped up to convert the penalty stroke for his and King's second goal. King's never looked back from that moment and dominated the rest of the match to cruise to a title win.

Rankin Cup

The team went into the Rankin Cup in Tauranga feeling positive, determined to win a medal at the top table of secondary schoolboys' Hockey for the first time since 2015. It is a gruelling event with seven matches in six days. In the pool matches, King's beat Palmerston North Boys' High School 4-3 on the Monday in a thrilling match with goals from Ed Irvine, Ben Wigmore (2) and Scott Illerbrun to secure an important win. The team followed up that success with two victories on the second day. On the Tuesday morning at the early start time of 8am, King's was a lot sharper than New Plymouth Boys' High School and edged a tight game 3-2 with two goals from Scott Illerbrun and one from Charlie Middleton to qualify for the last 16. The afternoon match was used to rest legs and rotate the bench in a comfortable 10-3 defeat of Bethlehem College with two goals apiece for Ben Wigmore, Tim Hamilton and Scott Illerbrun and singles for Tom Migounoff, Tom Hageman (Year 13, Major), Noah Hamlin (Year 13, School) and Tarquin Johnson. The victory secured King's position at the top of the pool.

In the last 16 against Hastings Boys' on the Wednesday, two goals from Scott Illerbrun and one from Oliver Stewart gave the team a convincing 3-1 victory.

In the guarter-final, goals from Scott Illerbrun, Ben Wigmore and Tim Hamilton helped King's to claim a tight 3-2 victory over Hamilton Boys' as the team showed grit and determination to beat the Waikato and Super 8 Hockey champions and earn a deserved victory. Hamilton Boys dominated the opening quarter as King's found themselves on the back foot in the early stages of the match and scored with a penalty stroke in the ninth minute. This King's team had bundles of character though and bounced back immediately. A minute later, Scott Illerbrun won possession on the halfway line and weaved his way through the Hamilton Boys' defence, dribbling past seven players before intelligently lobbing the goalkeeper. It was an outstanding individual effort for the team when the chips were down. Almost immediately, Ben Wigmore repeated the effort, again dribbling past several players before slamming the ball low past the Hamilton goalkeeper to give King's a 2-1 advantage. King's added a third in the second quarter when Tim Hamilton dived full length to deflect a penalty corner high into the net and put King's in the driving seat. Hamilton Boys' did pull one back at a penalty corner but King's managed the end of the game successfully to earn a great victory.

The team came back down to earth with a bump, though, in the semi-final as they endured heartbreak crashing out of the Rankin Cup 1-5 to defending champions Timaru Boys' High School in a seesaw semi-final on the Friday. The scoreline flattered their opponents as King's had to deal with some contentious umpiring decisions that resulted in Timaru's goals and put King's on the back foot for most of the game. The team's lone goal came from Scott Illerbrun at a penalty corner, his 39th goal of the season.

The team showed their strength of character in the battle for the bronze medals with a commanding 3-nil victory over Westlake Boys. Goals from Charlie Middleton, Tarquin Johnson and Ralph Farrands gave the team victory and King's College's 15th medal at the Rankin Cup and the first since 2015.

Credit must be given to the outstanding leadership team of Captain Tom Migounoff, Vice-Captain Ben Wigmore and Scott Illerbrun, who galvanised the team and drove them to success.

The 2024 Europe tour, which took place at the start of the year and involved both Boys and Girls' First XIs, saw the teams touring around the Netherlands, Belgium and northern France. The teams played well throughout, took in lots of knowledge from many coaches and watched professional games. Ultimately the tour was a success and gave the team a season-defining push to the start of the year. I think the Europe tour set our sights on bigger goals and made us all the more eager to earn some silverware.

The first Super City round went well, dominating most teams and then on to the second highlight, the annual Auckland Grammar vs King's match. The atmosphere at a game like this is incredible and hard to explain without having been in a similar circumstance before, although drawing 2-all in the end meant Auckland Grammar retained the Shield. I think the boys learnt a lot from the game and realised when we played well there was no reason we couldn't compete with the best in New Zealand. This belief transformed training and games, making us work harder and be eager to improve, which in the end led to us winning the Super City final in swift fashion over Saint Kentigern College.

King's threw everything at WGHS over the next two quarters, pulling the keeper in the final 5 minutes to try to score the much-needed equaliser, only to concede a runaway goal in the last minute of the game to lose 2-4. It was a bitter pill to swallow after dominating the entire match.

Tuesday was the day that was going to determine who progressed to the Federation Cup or who was going to play for the Marie Fry Trophy. First up was CGHS and again King's started well and dominated with CGHS just holding on to keep King's scoreless. This proved the case all game until the defining moment when **Amelia Alston** (Year 13, Middlemore) took a ball to the face and Phoebe MacGill (Year 12, Middlemore) broke a finger. With the loss of both these girls, CGHS pounced and scored two goals to secure the win and send King's to the Marie Fry competition. With a rearranged line-up and a point to prove, King's overcame a determined John Paul College team to win 5-1. Rowing

King's College Rowing 2023/24 Season: A Year of Resilience and Success

As the Head of Rowing at King's College, I've had the privilege of leading the team through a season that has been both challenging and rewarding. In November, just a month into the season, our boatshed was devastated by a fire that destroyed most of our equipment and left us without access to our boathouse. Despite the setback, our team showed incredible resilience. Led by our rowing captains Jackson Compain (Year 13, Selwyn) and **Kara Lorch-Church** (Year 13, Middlemore) and supported by the wider rowing community - the squad continued to train and race in borrowed boats.

Overcoming Adversity: North Island Secondary School Championships

Following a strong training period in the new year we sent a squad of 52 rowers to the North Island Secondary School Championships at Lake Kārapiro. The team delivered some outstanding performances, competing across 14 A Finals and five B Finals, with an impressive 84% of our rowers making it to the A Finals (top eight). We secured two North Island titles, in the U18 novice eight and U16 eight, and more than half the team gained a podium placing. King's finished 6th overall out of 79 schools and was the top-ranked Auckland school – a testament to the grit and determination of our rowers.

National Success: Maadi Cup

The highlight of our season was undoubtedly the Maadi Cup at Lake Ruataniwha in Twizel. We took a squad of 34 to what is Rowing's National Championships. Our rowers performed exceptionally well, competing in eight A Finals and four B Finals. Fifteen students medalled across four crews, and our Boys' U15 coxed-four crew won a national title. Seeing our girls' programme perform well at the regatta was pleasing also, highlighting a medalling result through lone Eadie's (Year 12, Middlemore) silver medal in the U16 single scull. King's finished 6th in the Executive Trophy standings for 'top sweep school' and 12th overall on the national medal table out of 104 schools. Once again, we were the top-ranked Auckland school at this regatta.

These successes are the result of the collective efforts of a large group of people. Thank you to our rowers, coaches, parents and support from the wider community this past season. Thanks also goes to our teaching staff involved in rowing: **Daryl Williams** and Mark Johnston, who led our on-land fitness training, and Craig Birkbeck, for his strength sessions and programming. I thank you all for the time and energy you commit to supporting the rowing programme at King's.

The 2024 Rugby season witnessed significant changes in team personnel, particularly within the First XV coaching group. Led by Head Coach lan Robinson, the new coaching team included assistants Taufa Fifita, myself (Pita Alatini) and Lynn Hunkin, along with managers Mark McHattie and Kerry Baker.

Under lan's leadership, the coaching programme focused on gaining player buy-in, particularly after the challenges faced in the 2023 season. A strong emphasis was placed on inclusivity within the Rugby community. This commitment was exemplified through an open invitation for players to trial for the First XV and a successful Rugby Community Day. During this event, senior players conducted a coaching clinic for junior players, followed by a BBQ and social gathering at the Golf Clubhouse to strengthen connections and establish a pathway for the 2024 season.

The First XV began the season with positive momentum, securing pre-season victories against De La Salle College, Scots College, Otago Boys' High School, and Napier Boys' High School, along with a narrow loss to the National Champions Southland Boys' High School. 

First XV

It was a new chapter for King's Rugby in 2024 as a new coaching group took charge of the First XV. The pre-season was planned prior to my appointment so we had a great understanding of what we were walking into as Term 1 started. We hastily arranged a meeting in Week 1 to set out our stall and clearly outline the expectations that would be in place for the pre-season. This was met with some scepticism by the players but as the early stages of pre-season progressed, it was clear that the players were buying into the process. We agreed to open up the selection process to any player who wished to trial for the First XV, running our first block as a skills and conditioning one. This block consisted of three morning sessions and one afternoon session per week. The sessions were well attended, with over 50 boys present at each opportunity - all vying for the chance to compete for a place in the First XV squad. This was a great sign of things to come, as the intensity and demands were increasing as we approached our selection phase. The selection phase consisted of an internal trial and a trial against a De La Salle College selection process which was held at King's. We applied what we had learnt throughout the pre-season and performed well. It was clear that there would be some tough selection decisions to make prior to moving into our pre-season block.

We selected a larger squad to compete throughout our preseason block. From experience, it was clear that we would use more than 32 players over the course of the season so it was decided to split the pre-season block into three components. The first component would see 22 players selected to travel to Wellington with several senior players remaining in Auckland. This team would play Scots College in what was our first game of the season. Early season rust was evident, but the team performed well and came away with a 22-5 win. The following week, a larger squad of 25 was selected to travel to Dunedin to compete for the Sir Keith Hay Park Trophy against Otago Boys' High School before heading further south to take on Southland

Boys' High School, the defending National Champions. The game against Otago Boys' was played on a dewy morning at Alhambra Rugby Club in the heart of Dunedin. It was great to see a strong contingent of King's College Old Collegians who came out to support the team. After a slow start, King's quickly asserted its dominance and the team performed very strongly to win 38-15 and win the Sir Keith Hay Park Trophy. This was a great start to our mini tour as the team was starting to click.

We then drove south to Invercargill to take on a formidable Southland Boys', who had been preparing to depart for the Sanix World Schools Tournament in Japan. The squad was rotated with several players getting an opportunity in the game facing Southland. After a very slow start against a dominant Southland Boys' unit, our boys hit their stride in the second half, coming back from nil-19 down to take the lead 22-19 with only minutes remaining. A lapse in concentration at scrum time led to King's losing a tight head and Southland went on to score in the corner, taking the lead and expecting the final whistle to go. However, King's had other ideas as there was enough time for the kick-off. King's retained the ball and worked hard to create an opportunity, only to be held up over the line in what was the last play of the game. The game finished 24-19 to Southland Boys' but there were some green shoots beginning to form. The character of our boys was a real highlight in their performance. This character would be tested throughout the season as tougher challenges lay ahead.

The final and most important aspect of our pre-season was the connection camp that was held at School House at King's. Having had to split the group due to logistics, we felt it was important to reconnect with the wider group and ensure we continued to build on the connection we knew would be critical for a successful season. The camp began with an Anzac service at the College and continued over two days where the team worked through

the process of creating their culture agreement which would underpin the purpose, behaviours and signposts for success that we would see in the 2024 First XV. Final selections were also made at this camp as the group prepared for a First and Second XV fixture vs Napier Boys' High School at home. The fixture was a fiercely contested battle in front of a large crowd with King's again starting slowly. Napier raced out to a 12-point lead before King's began to play their way back into contention. Ultimately, King's ran out winners, 35-24. The School House camp was also where the Toki was introduced. This is a special totem used to celebrate the individual who upholds our cultural agreement on a weekly basis throughout the season.

The 1A season started with a bang with tough fixtures vs Liston College at home and De La Salle College away in the first two weeks. The character that was developed throughout pre-season was critical to our successful start, seeing King's beat Liston 36–31 with a critical turnover under our posts on the final whistle. The following week King's travelled the short distance to De La Salle and snuck a 31-28 win after a stunning kicking performance by Marco Miln (Year 12. Selwyn). Our successful start allowed for a test-match approach to a third fixture against Saint Kentigern College, which was one of the outstanding games of the year. A focused and cunning approach to the week allowed King's to tweak its game plan to show a different picture. This approach was very successful against a highly fancied St Kent's team. King's performed admirably coming within a collapsed driving maul of beating the supposed "best team in the competition". This was a devastating loss for the players but rather than sulking, there was a clear sense of what might have been and it was clear the loss did not damage the morale of the group but grew the belief in the group that they could compete at the highest level. The game finished 22-27. As we entered King's Birthday weekend, the team had a 2-1 record and were facing a daunting run of fixtures over the coming three rounds.

Round 4 saw King's host Kelston Boys High School, who would go on to later win the 1A title. A large crowd assembled at King's as the buzz around the school throughout the week leading into the game was a great experience for our young team. The first half was tight with two individual errors leading to a 12-nil lead for Kelston. Again, I must acknowledge the character of the First XV as they listened intently to the messaging at half-time and backed each other up as the second half began. The second half was a different story, with King's scoring 15 unanswered points to lead the game 15-12 in the closing stages. King's conceded a penalty on their own 40m line with seconds to go and the Kelston captain chose to take a scrum. King's took real pride in their defence and managed to hold Kelston out, forcing a mistake, which led to the final whistle. This was a real comingof-age performance for our young group and one which will live fondly in our memories for the many reunions that are to come.

Round 5 saw the traditional Auckland Grammar fixture, which King's hosted this year. To much fanfare, this game was built up due to both King's and Grammar performing well in the early stages of the competition. However, once the whistle blew, there was only one team who was ready. Auckland Grammar enjoyed 15 minutes of some of the best schoolboy Rugby that I have witnessed to build a 17-nil lead, including a drop goal by their first five. However, King's fought back with real heart and went into half-time with the score at 12-17. There was a real belief at half-time that the tide had turned, and we had an opportunity



to build on our strong finish to the first half. This feeling came through as King's worked into a 26-24 lead with only 10 minutes remaining. However, in true schoolboy Rugby fashion, youthful exuberance led to a mistake from a kick-off to allow Grammar to retake the lead with a penalty. Grammar would not surrender the lead and landed a final penalty to win the game, 30-26, in what was a great advertisement for schoolboy Rugby. The daunting run of fixtures ended the following week as a depleted King's side travelled to The Cage to take on St Peter's College. In what coincided with the worst run of sickness the team had experienced, King's was unable to match the St Peter's side, who took advantage of playing on the smaller field to overpower the depleted King's team. St Peter's won 25-14.

Kings enjoyed a more favourable run into the holidays with two big wins; 39-9 against Botany Downs Secondary College and an outstanding performance in the rain against a big St Paul's College side, taking the result to 43–5. The holiday break was an opportunity to recharge with several players selected into various representative programmes. Unfortunately a few injuries occurred at these matches, which put a further strain on the King's depth. A mid-holiday trip to Palmerston North Boys' High School was a difficult challenge with a young team playing in horrendous conditions. Palmerston Boys were the victors on the day. The following week saw a do-or-die clash away against Sacred Heart College. Always a tough fixture, this game proved to be a step too far with Sacred Heart performing above their position on the table, putting King's to the sword and taking the result to 24-48. From this point, it was becoming harder to see a route to the semi-finals for King's. Injuries had taken their toll on the group but with adversity came opportunity and several players took the chance to get capped at the First XV level. The final two fixtures of the season saw King's beat Dilworth School 52–17 away and Mount Albert Grammar 42–22 at home. These performances were very pleasing as several Year 12 players stepped up to gain valuable experience. With the conclusion of the 1A season, King's finished in 6th position, one competition point off 3rd place in what was one of the tightest finishes to the 1A competition in recent memory.

Winter Tournament Week saw the second instalment of the Independent Schools Tournament which, was held at St Paul's Collegiate in Hamilton. King's beat St Andrew's, lost to Christ's College and beat St Paul's on the final day. This tournament was a great opportunity to give some players an experience of playing First XV with a total of 36 players rotated through the games including four Year 10 players.

The 2024 season was a year that saw the First XV compete in all but one fixture, with several tight losses finishing within one score. The development of the players on and off the field was a real positive for the season. In 2025, a total of 26 of the 33 players used are returning, so the future looks bright.

This year, I was assisted by Pita Alatini, Taufa Fifita and Lynn **Hunkin**. I would like to thank these men for the work they put into the programme and the care they showed towards the students. Your guidance and expertise, along with your sense of humour, made it a very enjoyable year on the sidelines.

Craig Birkbeck worked tirelessly all year to ensure the players were in top physical shape. To Craig - although the early mornings and commitments outside your normal working remit are demanding, it is massively appreciated by each of the players. You provide exceptional care and leadership to our developing athletes and I want to thank you for the care and effort you gave throughout the year.

Mark McHattie and Kerry Baker again worked tirelessly behind the scenes to provide an exceptional experience for our young men. Managing a team is a huge effort that takes a tremendous amount of time away from your professional and personal life. Your commitment to the programme is unquestionable and the level of service you both provide is something that I know each player is grateful for.

Although he had limited experience in this position, his passing and kicking abilities were too impressive to overlook. He delivered strong performances in key matches, earning a selection for the Auckland Under-18 Gulls team. Zion Savaka (Year 12, Peart) stepped into the role when needed also, showcasing his physicality on both attack and defence. As the season progressed, Marco took on the first five positions and adapted seamlessly too, meeting the requirements of the role with ease.

Our midfield featured two promising players: Saia Manu (Year 12, Averill) and TJ Anae-Paila (Year 12, School). Both brought power, speed and excellent core skills to the team. Saia consistently pushed the ruck ball over the advantage line and capitalised on any gaps, while TJ's agility allowed him to easily beat defenders. His strong scramble defence was a highlight, although an unfortunate injury cut his season short. Both players held leadership roles, with Saia serving as vicecaptain and TJ as the defensive leader.

Parekaahu rose to the occasion, displaying remarkable maturity for his age, solid core skills and a willingness to learn. Spencer Capper (Year 12, Parnell) made his debut against Scots College and performed admirably against St Paul's Collegiate in the 1A competition. Zion provided coverage at second five when necessary also.

1R Maroon

As we had done over the last two seasons, we commenced this season with an internal trial towards the end of Term 1, as there were good numbers who had registered to play in the U-85kg grade this year. As it would turn out, there would be enough players to make up two teams to play each Saturday. The next weekend, everyone who was trialling played against Glendowie College in a pre-season match that I used as a final trial to allow every player to impress and gain selection for the final squad. We played three sessions and won 19-5, but there were signs of the makings of a strong, competitive team. Following this game, I announced my 1R Maroon squad for the season and the other team was to be known as the 1R Gold squad.

Nicholas Withers (Year 13, School), who was playing his third season with this team, was appointed captain and Deputy Head Boy Sam McKay (Year 13, Greenbank) was assigned vice captain. At the start of Term 2, we had two non-competition matches against Saint Kentigern (won 53-7) and Auckland Grammar (lost 14-23). The following weekend was the first round of our championship and we started with a tough 8-9 loss away against Sacred Heart College. Next up, we took on a school that was joining the U-85kg grade for the first time - Rosmini College and picked up a bonus-point win, scoring seven tries in our 41-11 win. Next was a rematch away against Glendowie College and we scored a further four tries to secure another bonus-point win 25-10. This was followed by a tough 20-17 win over St Peter's College, but we only managed to score three tries and were therefore denied a bonus point. The final game in Term 2 was an away midweek match vs Saint Kentigern College and with a number of injuries and absences for various reasons, we came up short and lost, 17-27.

Our first game in Term 3 was against Westlake Boys High School and again we ground out a narrow 17-16 win. Our next opponents were Mount Albert Grammar School and we scored five unanswered tries to pick up another bonus-point win, 27-nil. For our final pool match, we played Auckland Grammar on their number three artificial turf and we needed to beat them to earn ourselves a home semi-final. With 10 minutes left to play on the clock, we were only down 3-9 and tried to throw the ball around in a last-ditch effort to secure a win. What often happens when you are playing catch-up rugby is you need to take risks, which unfortunately meant we gave away two intercept tries and Auckland Grammar eased away, 3-23.

This loss meant that the following weekend we travelled back to Auckland Grammar for our semi-final and were scheduled to play on their number one field; however, when we arrived there, we were informed that the game had unfortunately been transferred the number three artificial field. After being down 8-12 at halftime (two tries to one), we fell apart in the second half and I just cannot explain what happened, but Auckland Grammar scored 40 unanswered points. Although it was a disappointing way to end the season, I was still very, very proud of the entire squad for how they played and never gave in.

I would like to thank every member of the team for their hard work and dedication during the season. I would like to thank, in particular, all of the Year 13 lads who led by example throughout the season, both at training and also in the matches. I wish them all much success as they move onto new challenges and I hope

The 2024 season started with a level of anticipation and belief that this year could be our year and the intensity of the preseason training enhanced that belief. With players all competing for spots across all the King's teams, the pre-season saw training with up to 34 players. The memory of 34 young men running Broncos and Malcolms at the end of summer heat, giving it their all, highlighted the passion and desire from the boys for a great new season.

With the first pre-season trial game on 7 April against Auckland Grammar, we were able to trial 33 players and every player stood up. Even with the disjointed nature of regularly swapping players, the team came out winning the game 26-24 - a positive start to the season. The following two trial games, against Saint Kentigern College and Macleans College, saw two more wins and with 17 tries across the first three games, there was a good base to build upon.

After the trial games, there was some further movement with some players swapping between squads, but we settled on a core group of 24 players.

As the regular season kicked off on 18 May, the reality of competition Rugby hit home with the first three games ending in nail-biters with King's winning by two against St Kent's (7-5), losing against Auckland Grammar by three (12–15) and Mount Albert Grammar School by two (13-15).

With two losses in the first three games, the boys rallied with three solid wins: against St Peter's College (20-nil), Sacred Heart College (23-12) and St Kent's (20-5). Another close loss to Auckland Grammar by four points (18-22) and we went into the July season holiday break with a record of four wins and three losses, sitting 3rd on the table.

After three very close losses by less than four points in the first half of the season, it highlighted that the team was close, but we just needed that last 10% lift to take out the close games.

One of the highlights and turning points of the year was when some of the boys were invited to train with the First XV for an intense and focused workout. The eight players who attended this training then brought the motivation and buzz back to the rest of the 5A team's training sessions and the intensity increased exponentially.

As we returned from the break with three competition games to go before the finals, the team needed just one further win to secure a semi-final place, and this was done in an emphatic style against Mount Albert Grammar with a big win (43-12). After another close win against St Peter's (27-24) and the final round-robin game against Sacred Heart with a hard-fought loss (11-20), this brought an end to the regular season with the King's 5A finishing 3rd on the table and thus securing a semi-final spot versus Sacred Heart.

With two previous intense matches against Sacred Heart during the season with one win apiece, the result of the semi-final was too hard to call. On a drizzly morning of the match and with all the boys meeting the weight limits, the scene was set for another epic game between the two rivals. The game was a back-andforth event; however, King's defence was rock solid and the desire to win was intense. With a try in the final minute of the

game and the conversion from the sideline, King's secured the win 20-10 and a place in the grand final.

We all woke to the grand final day with torrential rain coming down and the prospect of a very wet final versus Auckland Grammar. The match, although a wet one, showed great ballhandling skills and strong defence from both sides. Auckland Grammar opened the scoring with a penalty after 16 minutes. King's held most of the field position but couldn't bring together the last pass and 2 minutes before half-time, Auckland Grammar scored a converted try; this meant that King's went into half-time down, nil-10. The second half saw more great attacking and defence from both teams but with a few missed opportunities and Auckland Grammar getting another penalty, the final score was nil-13.

From the coaches of Martin Linstrom, Nik Lewis and Bill Howie, we would like to thank the boys and their parents for making the season extremely enjoyable and rewarding. While the loss in the final was disappointing, looking back on the season, the team can be very proud of its achievements and growth throughout. The quality of Rugby, the intensity and the comraderie of the team have made this a truly successful season and the boys should be very proud of themselves.



The final was a good day; they were on track for a top three. However, a disqualified ruling put them into a 6th-place finish at the National championship. This achievement highlighted their ability to compete at a high level regardless of the obstacles they faced.

Swimming



Tennis

It was another successful year for the King's College Tennis Club. After the National title for the King's Premier Mixed Tennis team in 2023, the Premier Girls' Tennis team of Kate Anderson (Year 13, Taylor), Zoe Driscoll (Year 11, Middlemore), Poppy Loutit (Year 13, Marion Bruce) and Renee Zhang (Year 13, Marion Bruce) repeated the national success with a well-earned victory at the New Zealand Secondary Schools Championships held at Merton Road in Auckland in March.

It was a stellar year for Renee Zhang, who had a career-high World Junior ranking of 223 in January, won both the New Zealand Under-18 Singles and Doubles Championships and won the Auckland Secondary Schools Champion of Champions title. She was also crowned the College Sport Auckland Young Sportsperson of the Year for Tennis.

In the Auckland Secondary Schools Championships, the Premier Girls team lost narrowly in the final on countback to Saint Kentigern College to finish runners-up. The Premier Boys team finished 3rd in their competition. Both teams qualified for the New Zealand Secondary Schools Championships as well, a reflection of the strength of Tennis talent at the school.

There was further success for King's Tennis players at the Auckland Secondary Schools Champions of Champions competition in April. Jacob Bargh (Year 9, Marsden) won the Junior Boys trophy, Zoe Driscoll and Sheetal Lal (Year 11, Marion Bruce) paired up to win the Intermediate Girls' Doubles crown and Renee Zhang won the Senior Girls' title. The College was also recognised for performing well at the event with the girls' team winning the James Aitkenhead Shield for the first time, awarded to the school team with the best-performing players at the tournament.

The King's College Tennis Club ran 16 teams in 2024 – 12 boys teams and four girls - with a varied degree of success. Congratulations to the Senior B Boys White team, managed by Ms Aarti Jyotika, who finished top of the table in their competition, while six teams finished runners-up in their respective competitions - Premier Girls, A3 Boys White, A3 Boys Blue (JMC), Senior B Boys White (NB), Junior A Boys Blue (DM) and the Junior B Boys Grey (AJ).

The House Tennis competition this year was won by School House who beat Marsden 5-nil in the final. In the semi-finals, Marsden beat Greenbank and School beat Major.

The major Tennis trophies went to Jacob Bargh, who won the Michael Innes-Walker Memorial Prize for Best Newcomer in Tennis, Aaditya Lal (Year 13, Peart), who won the CHT Palmer Cup for Senior Boys' Champion and Renee Zhang, who won the JS Taylor Cup for Senior Girls' Champion.



The Premier Girls' Tennis team are national champions!

The team, consisting of **Renee Zhang** (13, Marion Bruce House), Poppy Loutit (Year 13, Marion Bruce), Zoe Driscoll (Year 11, Middlemore) and Kate Anderson (Year 13, Taylor), put in an outstanding display to beat Queen Margaret College of Wellington 4-2 in the final of the New Zealand Secondary Schools Tennis Championships at Merton Road in east Auckland on Thursday 21 March.

Progressing to the final, the team beat St Cuthbert's College 6-nil, Saint Kentigern College 8-6 on set countback after a 3all draw and Wellington Girls College 5-1 in the semi-final. In the final against Queen Margaret College, King's won three of the four singles matches to put themselves in a good position. Although Kate Anderson fought hard and played an array of good shots before losing 5-7, 3-6 in her game, Zoe Driscoll levelled the match score at 1-all with a good display, winning her game 6-3, 6-4.

Top seed Renee Zhang knew she had a tough challenge facing her ITF doubles partner Maria Galatescu, but again secured a tidy victory, 6-4, 6-1. Poppy Loutit was on fire to win her game 6-2, 6-nil. Renee and Poppy remained unbeaten in their singles matches in the two title wins.

So, King's went into the doubles matches leading 3-1 and needed to win one of the doubles to become national champions. Renee and Poppy turned on the style in their 6-2, 6-3 victory to give King's the national title to rapturous applause from the crowd. In the other doubles, Zoe Driscoll/Kate Anderson showed some fighting qualities as they were edged 6-2, 2-6 and lost 8-10 in the super tiebreak, but the title was already won by that stage.

It was a tremendous team performance, with all players contributing to the title's success at various stages of the event It was also a special day for Renee Zhang and Poppy Loutit, who won their second national schools title in successive years, as they were part of the King's College Premier Mixed team that won the New Zealand Secondary Schools Premier Mixed Championship in Christchurch last year with **Dominik Wijntjes** (Major, 2019-23) and Fraser McLaren (Greenbank, 2019-23).

Poppy Loutit won all her matches at this year's tournament, both singles and doubles, whilst Renee Zhang won seven of her eight games.

Premier Boys' Tennis

If, as writer José Rizal once said, "Youth is the hope of our future", then the prospects for King's College Tennis look very rosy indeed. Captained by top seed and the only senior player Aaditya Lal (Year 13, Peart), the Premier Boys' Tennis team was a very young side in 2024 with Jacob Bargh (Year 9, Marsden), Oscar Chesterman (Year 9, Averill), Harry Driscoll (Year 9, Selwyn), Ben Donaldson (Year 10, School) and Finn James (Year 11, School) making up the team for the season. The team was coached and managed by **Keith Rowley** and punched well above its weight, only losing one game in the Auckland Secondary Schools Championships to eventual joint champions Westlake Boys High School to finish 3rd in Auckland, an improvement from 5^{th} in 2023, and finishing 8^{th} in the top division of the New Zealand Secondary Schools Championship. The team was hampered by key injuries/illnesses to Oscar and Harry, though, which prevented them from playing several Auckland matches and missing the Nationals.

Auckland Secondary Schools Championships

In a tough opening encounter in the Auckland Secondary Schools Championship, the Premier Boys' team faced defending champions Westlake Boys away on the North Shore, missing both Jacob (NZ Camp) and Harry (injured) but still turned in a string of impressive performances. The team lost both doubles matches and the first singles to fall nil-3 behind but clawed back the deficit with some gutsy displays to earn a 3-all draw. Aaditya dominated his singles to convincingly win 4-nil, 4-nil, while Oscar and Ben showed tremendous character to fight back from losing the opening sets of their singles matches to win their games in tie-breakers. King's lost the countback 6-8 on sets though. In the second match against arch-rivals Saint Kentigern College, King's proved the stronger and ran out 4-2 victors, winning both doubles and with Aaditya again winning his singles and Harry Driscoll digging deep to win his game in a tie-breaker after losing the first set. Botany Downs Secondary College provided a close match in the third game, with the teams tying the match 3-all but King's winning 34-30 on game countback. It couldn't get much closer than that. Aaditya and Oscar won their doubles match while Jacob and Harry won their singles.

The quarter-final pitched King's against Rangitoto College at home and the team again fought a competitive and tight match, sharing the spoils with a 3-all draw but winning 7-6 on sets in the countback. Harry and Finn won both their doubles and their singles to edge King's to victory.

Westlake was the formidable opponent in the semi-final, again held away on the North Shore, having ended the team's Auckland Secondary Schools aspirations in 2023 and Westlake proved too strong again in 2024. King's put in their most disappointing performance of the competition and were well beaten, 1-5. The ray of sunshine was Jacob's straight-sets victory in his singles match. The Auckland competition finished on a high note, though. Inspired by captain Aaditya Lal's victory over a player ranked two levels above him, the team turned in a superb performance to beat Macleans College 4-2 in the bronze medal match at Merton Road in east Auckland. After finishing 5th in 2022, it showed the impressive improvement of the team. In the doubles, top seeds Aaditya and Jacob put up a good show but were beaten 4–5 and 1–4 by their higher-ranked opponents

but Finn and Ben, both again promoted to the Premier team for the match, fought back from losing the first set 2-4, before grabbing the second 4–2 and going on to win the super tie-break 10-6 with some aggressive tennis. That left the match score at 1-all going into the four singles matches. Ben overpowered his opponent 4-nil and 4-1 in an impressive display before Jacob, playing at number two, was competitive against his much higherranked opponent but went down 2-4 and 1-4 to leave the match score at 2-all going into the last two remaining singles matches. No-one gave team captain Aaditya much of a chance against Macleans' top seed Kevin Li, ranked two grades above him, but Aaditya had been showing impressive improvement throughout the season. Things looked grim when he lost the first set nil-4 to the powerful hitting of his opponent, but Aaditya stayed in the rallies and gradually started to claw his way back into the match. Playing some superb tennis, he rattled his opponent to win the second set 4-2 and set up a decisive super tie-breaker, first to 10. Up stepped Year 11 Finn James, who was clinical in his demolition of his more fancied opponent in winning 4-2, 4-2, to give King's a 4-2 victory and the bronze medal.

NZSS Champs

At the New Zealand Secondary Schools Championships in March at Merton Road, the team had a tough baptism on the top table of secondary schools' tennis. Although the team matched its seeding of 8th, the team was disappointed by not taking the opportunities at key stages of matches and found the competition against the best teams in the country a challenge. The team for the Nationals was captain Aaditya Lal with Jacob Bargh, Ben Donaldson and Finn James. The team's cause wasn't helped by the absence of Oscar Chesterman and Harry Driscoll, ranked 2nd and 4th, through illness and injury, but their replacements Finn and Ben stepped up well.

King's was in the toughest group which saw the two finalists -Te Kura and Christ's College - emerge from its pool. In its earlier matches, King's lost to eventual champions Te Kura 2-4 and eventual runners-up Christ's College nil-6.

In their final pool match against ACG Parnell College, the team trailed 1-3 after the singles but fought back to win both doubles to tie the scores at 3-all. The result meant that the teams were tied on match score (3-all), tied on sets (7-all) but King's earned the victory on games countback (76-74). In the classification round, King's was well-beaten nil-6 by Hamilton Boys' High School. In their final match for 7th and 8th against Tauranga Boys' College, the team looked tired after the demanding matches earlier in the tournament but still dug deep to push their opponents hard before losing 1–5. All four singles matches went to super tie-breaks to make it a long day for the team, but Tauranga won three of the four to lead 3–1 going into the doubles. The highlight of the day was Ben Donaldson's gutsy effort to fight back from losing the first set 1-6 to win the second 6-4 and then win the super tie-break 10-5. This was the fourth time over the course of the season that Ben had fought back from losing the first set to win his match in a super tie-break. His matches certainly brought the crowds back to Tennis. Jacob Bargh put in a good display also, before losing his game 6-2, 5-7, 3-10 in another super tie-breaker, while Finn James exchanged the lead several times in his game, before losing 6-3, 2-6, 8-10, going close to victory. In the final singles game, Aaditya Lal also lost in a super tie-break, losing 6-4, 4-6, 5-10.

So, King's went into the doubles matches, needing to win both to stand any chance of salvaging the match, but the Jacob Bargh/ Ben Donaldson pairing went down 2-6, 3-6 while Aaditya Lal/ Finn James, hampered by injuries that made serving difficult, went down 6-nil, 1-6. Overall, the Nationals proved a challenging week for the team but lots of important lessons learnt ahead of the exciting future for this young team. A special thanks must go to captain Aaditya Lal, who provided excellent support and encouragement for his young team throughout the season.

Ros-Alan Uepi (Year 9) had a fantastic debut, winning the Junior Boys' 200m and 400m, and coming 2nd in the 100m and Shot-Put. Meanwhile, Major won the Intermediate Boys' Shot-Put and Senior Girls' Triple Jump thanks to **Christopher Hatch** (Year 11) and Milana Henderson (Year 13), respectively.

Ask anyone in Major, though, and they will say that the highlight of the year was House Music. Our winning streak continued as we secured our third consecutive Girls' House Touch title. We also triumphed in the Girls' Competition for House Orienteering, with Freddie Hatton (Year 11), Mila Hrstic (Year 11), Lucy Jacobson (Year 12) and Maddie Paterson (Year 12) winning 1st place in the Senior Girls competition.

I think the success we celebrate for the students of Middlemore can be credited to the supportive environment we have in the House. This begins when we welcome the new students into Middlemore at the start of the year with our traditional annual stay-in weekend, a weekend where all 84 students stayed in the House for its entirety. It is a fabulous bonding opportunity for both new and returning students of Middlemore.

junior boy **Sebastian Segers** (Year 10), also played significant roles towards our success. Their exceptional performances in the House Relays were crucial in securing valuable points. In addition, their individual efforts resulted in several podium finishes across various events, with Kara Chan achieving 1st place in the Senior Girls' 50m Butterfly and the 100m IM, and 2nd place in the 100m Freestyle, demonstrating the depth of talent within Parnell. This collective effort across all age groups was how our House claimed the overall victory, reinforcing our new swimming legacy.

The second inter-House competition of the year – Athletics in Term 1 - was another thrilling showcase of Parnell's athletic prowess and House spirit. Despite our determination to secure the championship for another consecutive year, we faced fierce competition and ultimately placed 3rd. However, this result did not overshadow the outstanding individual performances of our athletes. In the Intermediate category, Quinn Winwood (Year 11) displayed remarkable endurance, winning the 400m and claiming 2nd in the 800m. Our field events saw equally impressive results, with **Neve Johnson** (Year 13) taking the top spot in the Senior Girls' Javelin. Maggie Sims (Year 12) shone on the track also, winning the Senior Girls' 200m B final. These performances, while not enough to clinch the overall victory, showed the dedication and talent within our House, and set a positive tone for the competitions to come.

As well as our outstanding performances in Athletics and Swimming, Parnell enjoyed a remarkable year in various other sports. Our athletes excelled in inter-House Cricket and Touch Rugby, both of which we won.

The Senior Boys' Football team showcased their skill and teamwork too. Comments from the team and those watching the games suggest our starting right-back was a big factor in securing 1st place in their competition. We placed 2nd in Archery, demonstrating our versatility across different sports and our teams made impressive runs to the semi-finals in Badminton, Basketball, Junior Boys' Hockey, Junior Boys' Rugby and Junior Boys' Water Polo as well. Collectively, these achievements led to Parnell finishing 2^{nd} overall in the College for House Sports. This year has truly highlighted the spirit and determination of our students and our 'Tōtō Koura' (bleed gold) attitude.

As the year progressed, we shifted our focus to the House Music competitions. Our Small House band defied expectations, securing an impressive 5th-place finish – a massive achievement for Parnell, which has not typically been great in this area. events such as the Triple Jump proved very useful for the House. In House Touch Rugby, St John's put up a valiant fight. Our team won their first match against Greenbank but lost in a competitive semi-final against Parnell, showcasing strong teamwork and determination.

In Cycling, our House team, including Charlie Field, Oskar Masfen (Year 12), Juleo Tauu and James Yeoman, showed grit and endurance, finishing 4th in the gruelling relay-style event. House Orienteering saw a solid performance too, with Connor Empson (Year 13) taking 1st place in the Senior division and Sophie Stening and Sasha Nicol coming 2nd and 3rd, respectively, in the girls' category, helping St John's secure 3rd place overall.

Our participation in Archery, Cricket and other House events rounded out a year of memorable sporting achievements. In Cricket, we set a commanding total of 123 runs against Averill,

The whole House put in major effort for multiple weeks with nightly practices, although, similarly to Small House, the judging didn't go our way. The boys can be so proud of what they put together. A huge recognition for Morgan Tapper for organising the moves and Ronald Wang again for the musical side of things.

Likewise, on the cultural front, the annual St John's Skit Night was interesting as always, with a Matariki focus this year. Each dorm put together an act for an audience of parents and siblings, providing many good laughs. The weeks celebrating different languages around the world are special to St John's as we have many students from just about anywhere you can name. Tongan Language Week was celebrated with a Kahoot with prizes and also a generous dinner provided by the Mafile'o family. Our Cook Island Language Week celebration was held in a similar fashion with a delicious Cook Island doughnut feed being delivered to the House. Finally, Te Wiki o Te Reo Māori celebration was held with multiple fried bread evening snacks.

Our academic performance remained strong, with students receiving numerous Endeavour and Excellence awards. The amazing reports of attitude and effort coming from notably the younger years in the House put St John's in a good position for many more academic achievements to come. Our outstanding performers with 100% A's were Jacky Su (Year 10), Hugo Velvin (Year 11) and Alfie Wei (Year 11), with Stephen Sun (Year 12 achieving four out of five A's, which could be seen as more challenging given he is Year 12.

This year has been a testament to the strength, camaraderie and resilience of St John's House. Our successes in 2024 would not have been possible without the dedication of our students, staff and prefect team. I'd like to extend my heartfelt thanks to the whole Year 13 dorm, who have all worked so well together over the past five years, and obviously to the amazing staff that help us each day.
